Her illness hos exhausted every bit of money we had. Now I manage to eke out a bare existence for our little family by feddling notions from a puolent in a marketplace. Believe me, Mrs. zlaborsky, if it wee at all possible for me to pay for my danglite's transfortation I would be only too happy to do so in order that I might not have to go therough the humeleation of exposing my impoverialised circumstances. Blabovsky - as one Jewish mother to another please do what you can to have her commetted to the Kings County Hospital for mental Diseases in Brooklyn, nen york. July 18, 1938. Mrs. Albert Bereck, 89 Moore Street. Brooklyn, N. Y. Dear Mrs. Bereckt -Answering your letter of the 16th, I want you to know that we are truly in sympathy with your unfortunate daughter, but the El Paso community cannot assume the expense of sending her back to New York. There are no funds available for such a purpose. To leave her in our County Jail is tragic, and am now appealing to you to secure the funds necessary for her return to New York. Since it will be necessary to send an attendant with her, which will entail an additional expense of a round trip ticket, and about \$5.00 a day expenses, I would suggest that either you or some other relative come to El Paso and take her home. As much as we would like to help you, we find it impossible to do so financially. If you cannot raise the necessary funds, would suggest that you contact the Charity Organizations in Brooklyn. This being a New York Case, they are liable. Thanking you for your prompt response, I am Yours very truly, Mrs. Frank Zlabovsky. Field Executive.
