No license fee by Haavaremarks

Charge 75 cents per order to send

If sent by cable charge \$1.00

Limit Marks 200.00 permonth, not over.

Married couple together Marks 200.00 monthly

Members of the same household can receive Marks 200.00 each but not more than a total of marks 600.00

If someone wants to send more than Marks 200.00, than he has to send Marks 250.00 in Haavaremarks and the rest in Dollars.

If for monthly support than it is possible to send Marks 200.00 more, that would mean altogether Marks 400.00. The same for birthdays, silver-weddings, golden-weddings and for holidays September 6, 1937, November 29, 1937, March 17, 1938 and April 16, 1938.

When the people cash it over there, there will be a charge
