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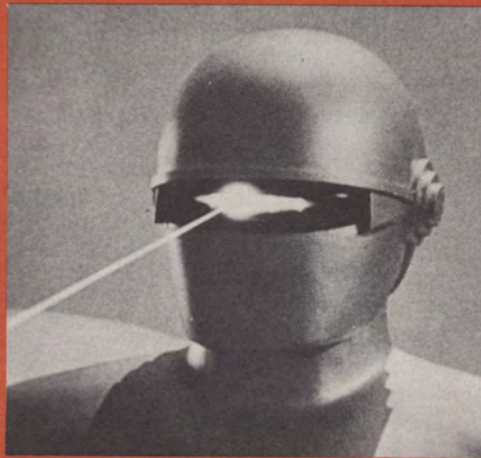

# THE VIEW FROM THE HILL



Jay S. Gaenzle, whose photograph you see in this column, is our new Director of Development as of January 26, 1976. He replaces Lloyd Leech who retired at the end of 1975.

A bit of biography on Jay is in order. (Gaenzle, incidentally, is pronounced GAN-zul, the GAN rhyming with ran; but he says "You call, I'll haul.")

We've had a bit of feedback on our 10th anniversary NOVA issue, including a great letter from Doug Early, the original NOVA editor, on the *real* origin of the magazine name. Doug's letter is worth quoting at length:

"I had been at the News and Information Office but a little while when I realized that Texas Western was being upstaged by every other college publicity office in the Southwest. Dozens of slick, professional-looking alumni magazines crossed my desk that first year. Never mind that the fancy covers often enclosed a packet of pabulum; I always envisioned the exciting stories we could tell—if Texas Western had such an outlet.

"Those were the days when Texas Western's sole contact with its alumni was via an insipid little folder called REPORT. Steele Jones, assistant to the President, was my mentor. He remembers how I 'fretted' over each wretched issue of REPORT. Perhaps 'fretted' is an understatement. To compare that stylized format with one of the better alumni magazines was to invite cardiac arrest, or somesuch.

"Anyhow, it was a fortunate time in which college policy was guided by Joseph Ray, Milton Leech, and, of course, Steele Jones. I broached the idea of a magazine to Steele, he carried it forward with enthusiasm, and it was accepted promptly—so promptly, in fact, that I had no occasion to argue my case. Although I customarily avoid clichés, I think this is the time to drop one: it was an idea whose time had come—and Messrs. Ray and Leech, bless them, were awake to the idea.

"Although you couldn't call it unplanned parenthood—I had dreamed too long on the prospect—I suddenly found myself with an unnamed child. What to call it?

"Enter Bassel Wolfe, good friend and confidante, who then was teaching courses in art at TWC while establishing a business in the city. He was among the group of creative persons I enlisted to help me select a name for the new magazine. It was Bassel who made the ultimate contribution.

"Early on the name-game, you see, we placed certain restrictions on the nature of the name. Not only did we want to avoid such awful appellations as 'Alumni News' or 'Miner Musings,' we wanted something that would dominate the front cover—preferably a four-letter word, in good taste, of course. Call it the 'cosmetic' effect, if you please. It would also be nice, we reasoned, if the title reflected a proper image for our college.

"One night, as Bassel lay in bed pondering a name, he was arrested by a reflection in the mirror. It was the reflection of a cosmetic jar which his wife had just placed on the vanity. It read NOVA, loud and clear. NOVA, you see, is AVON spelled backward..."

(We'll continue Doug's account in the next issue. In the meantime, we want Doug to know how much we appreciate having his letter and splendid history of the origins of this magazine.)

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# The Great EXISTENTIAL BASKETBALL TILT

## *The Bear and the Miracle Miners of '66*

After trailing by as many as 15 points in the first half, Texas Western's 'Miracle Miners,' coached by Don Haskins, rallied to gain their 29th win of a long season by a 72-71 count. The comeback was capped by the last-second heroics of 5' 6" guard Willie Worsley, who turned a twisting layup into a three-point play with 0:16 on the clock. Haskins, who picked up two technical fouls during the game, displayed a rare pleasure at the outcome, saying 'I didn't think we could spot 'em 15, but I guess we can.' The win reassured the 1966 NCAA champs of the number-one ranking they have enjoyed since their 72-65 triumph over Kentucky, nearly 10 years ago...

The temptation to go on like that, commemorating the greatest moment in Miner sports history, should be understandable. After all, I had just come from a privileged spot on the Miner bench. I sat not six inches from the storied sound and fury of America's most discipline-conscious coach, where I had watched a reunion group of the NCAA Basketball Champions of 1966 beat a team of UTEP All-Stars. And while the July 17 game was arranged as a "fun" benefit by El Paso's United Way Youth Committee, it had taken on a greater implication long before 4,000 screaming fans rose to their feet in the wild last minute of play. Besides all the apparent good humor, congeniality and charity which colors any alumni game anywhere, certain undercurrents had converged to make this reunion a very important one.

First, the winning of the 1966 championship was an achievement that has lingered on in the memory of even the El Paso sports non-fan. Texas Western became the only school to interrupt UCLA's reign as NCAA Champion during the ten years from 1964 to 1973. Any commentator would admit that 1966 was the Year of the Underdog Triumph. TWC was an unknown institution with no national sports heritage, while its Kentucky opponents boasted one of the top 50-year records in college basketball. One national sports-writer had termed the semifinal game pitting Duke and Kentucky "the true championship game," for no national source considered TWC or its semifinal opponent, Utah, as serious competition for the Blue Devils or Wildcats. Even though TWC entered the title game with a 27-1 record and had finished third in the wire-service polls behind Kentucky and Duke, the Miner's seemingly zero heritage and lack of a visible superstar led editors to regard them, at best, as an odds-against wildcard.

Local fans knew, however, that the Miners were a strong team that had beaten Iowa, Arizona State, and New Mexico during the regular season, as well as Cincinnati, Oklahoma, and Kansas (Haskins labelled the Jayhawks the best team he saw in '66) in the playoffs. They knew of the disregard of the national press and relished the thought of pulling off the "impossible."

Others around the country were struck with the idea of seeing Adolph Rupp upset as well, for the Kentucky coach had never been a particularly humble winner and he had won plenty. I remember awaiting the game in an Ohio tavern with a clientele almost unanimous in its support for the unknown school from somewhere in Texas. Much of that smoky, beer-flavored talk centered on the puzzling absence of a star player to watch for: "What makes those guys so good, then?" one of my friends wondered, just before game time.

The answer came soon enough. While no squad member ever achieved superstar status, clearly the 1966 group was an excellent complementary unit, each player contributing a particular strength. Bobby Joe Hill was the playmaker, the ballhandler with outstanding speed; Harry Flournoy was the forward that Haskins remembers as his best-ever rebounder; likewise Orsten Artis was one of his best outside shooters; David (Daddy D) Lattin, at 6'7" and 240 pounds was an imposing defensive and pick-setting center; Nevil Shed offered consistency; Willie Worsley, Willie Cager, Jerry Armstrong and Flip Baudoin created great depth. No Austin Carr, David Thompson or Kareem Abdul-Jabbar in the group. Just a team of highly talented players and a hard-driving coach.





Ken Hayes, former Tulsa head coach now at New Mexico State, recently applauded Haskins' part in the championship effort as "The best coaching job I've ever seen." John Wooden called the 1966 Miners the most poised team he remembers. Haskins himself admits that the coaching effort was one of the best he has given: "They were about the hardest team to coach I've ever had. The trouble with those guys was that they knew they were good and so they tended to get lazy out there. That's why we had those so-called 'miracle comebacks' like the New Mexico game (where the Miners overcame a 20 point deficit to win 67-64 in overtime). We played a lot of close games, in fact, just because we'd be lazy for three-fourths of a game and then decide to play."

Haskins is not a coach to offer complicated excuses. For him the notion of a good team's letdown toward the end of a long and successful season is unacceptable. He prefers to discuss performance in absolutes: "Today we played lousy. Stunk up the gym. I'm embarrassed." When pressed about the season-ending loss to Seattle, a team they had beaten soundly earlier, Haskins' explanation is simple. "Well they did have a good team, you know. And they played better than we did that night."

Haskins' intensity is familiar to Miner basketball fans, with his courtside behaviour the stuff of legend. A bad pass, cheap foul, missed defensive assignment or forced shot will bring him immediately to his feet, red-faced and shouting reminders to the official or his players. Sometimes the "instructions" are succinct enough to amuse the nearby fans; and if the offender is an official, Haskins will often draw a technical. There is method in these histrionics, however, for the Haskins-patterned offense and tight defense demand a carefully called game. Officials cannot be casual, and Haskins makes sure of that. Likewise, a player cannot afford the exuberant mistakes that are tolerable in a "run and gun" game. A careless play usually results in the offender being given a minute or

two of added ignominy on the bench to reflect. But if the method seems harsh, it seems to work in keeping the players focused on the Haskins game plan. No regular Miner player has ever been termed undisciplined, and the pressure of playing on the road may well be lessened when the players and officials alike fear the reactions of the big coach far more than the distant catcalls from the stands.

Haskins does not put much stock in such analysis and tends to belittle his own contribution to the 1966 championship effort. "You know, that loss to Seattle might have been the most helpful thing of all," he explains. "You have to understand that the most important aspect of that bunch was that they just hated to lose. And you just can't instill a winning attitude by coaching. You have to find players who have it when they come to you, and these guys had it. When they lost to Seattle, they got a real jolt to their pride. Otherwise they might have gone to sleep on Kansas or Cincinnati. They almost did with Utah anyway. They played terrible in that game."

Support for Haskins' theory became evident during the "fun" United Way game. With most of the players understandably overweight and otherwise out of shape, they were behind by 15 points as the half approached—but they were also very concerned. Haskins himself was up, shouting red-faced instructions to David Lattin. Nevil Shed, panting out a brief rest on the bench, added his own encouragement, then slammed a water container to the floor when one of the All-Stars drove for an easy bucket. At the intermission, the dressing room atmosphere was gloomy; the players, who had clowning raucously before the game, were quiet, sometimes trading advice in lowered voices. Haskins affected lightness, shaking his head as they headed back to the court. "It's the worst game I ever watched," he kidded. But his smile faded quickly.

Once back on the floor, the TWC players insisted on 10 minute quarters (up from eight) for the two remaining periods and also stipulated that the clock, which had been running unimpeded, be stopped for fouls and other interruptions. When Karen Logan, former women's basketball professional and member of the El Paso Sol volleyball team, substituted as prearranged for Lattin, the players seemed restless, their smiles growing thin at Logan's dribbling stunts. With Logan out, they renewed their serious effort and trimmed the lead to two points by the end of the third quarter.

In the fourth period, Haskins, who had initially told the TWC players to substitute themselves in and out, reneged on his earlier promise and began to confer with Shed on replacement strategy. The TWC players seemed relieved, for they needed their best guns: the All-Stars, with Scott English, Ed Lynum, Nolan Richardson, and Beto Bautista





playing very well, had not turned out to be pushovers.

At one point, as Haskins was up to protest a holding call and drawing his second technical, Shed caught sight of me furiously scribbling and leaned close, behind his mentor's back. "You know," the current Assistant Basketball Coach at Wyoming grinned, "we realize it's not a serious game, but most of us can't help getting excited anyway. It's in your blood. Even the coach there. That's only half a put-on."

With 3:42 left and the champs still down by four, Haskins actually called a time-out for a strategy session. With all the players kneeling expectantly at the bench, Haskins cleared his throat, began to speak, and then seemed to change his mind about something. "Just run your offense, now," he said reassuringly, and all the eyes were steady on his. At the 0:54 mark, it was 69-71 and the TWC players were scrambling like men possessed. At 0:21 a wild struggle for a jammed ball resulted in offsetting technical fouls and a jump ball. Haskins steamed, his arms folded, and his head turned rapidly from the play in a patented gesture of exasperation, "I can't believe that. Never saw anything like it." Then, all 4,000 in the gym and on the bench were on their feet as Worsley took control of the tipped ball and set himself toward the goal...

A few days after the exhibition, Haskins smiled over his lunch of green enchiladas and talked of the spirit he'd seen rekindled. "And that's why I'm not interested in coaching for the pros. It's hard enough getting a bunch of winners like ours up game after game. Think about trying to do that in the pros." Then he reiterated his fondest recollection of the championship year. "Really it was the pride that sooner or later got them going. They knew they were good and so they were always poised, even when they were down by 20. I never felt they were out of it. That team could put it up on the third pass or the twentieth." Rare praise for a patterned-offense coach.

"Yep, that pride, and the crowd at the airport is what I remember most (local papers reported 10,000 at the welcoming reception). But that kind of fan support is continual here." And that is probably the biggest reason why he stays in El Paso, the coach says, his face set. The other offers have been rolling in fairly regularly since the championship, but Haskins seems to like his audience in El Paso. "There have been years when we've had a bad record, but instead of complaining, our fans just cheer louder." He was smiling now.

While Haskins attacked his enchiladas, Ralph Coulter, Campus Police Chief, who had been quietly sipping coffee at the same table, mentioned that he drove the coach home following the airport victory reception for the 1966 champions. "I sure expected he'd be jumping up and down, or at least be a little bit excited, but all he said was 'Take me home, will

ya, Ralph?" and nothing else all the way." Haskins shrugged and told his friend Coulter that it had been a long trip and that he was just tired. Perfectly natural even to a man whose presence has spawned the "Bear Club", an *ad hoc* group of fans who endlessly chant the affectionate nickname until Haskins emerges from the pre-game locker room conference.

The championship game itself had been a fairly workmanlike exhibition for the 1966 Miners, lacking the dramatic finish that had characterized many of the late-season and playoff wins. Even Adolph Rupp, proud compiler of the second best winning percentage in college basketball history, admitted that the two famous steals by Bobby Joe Hill midway through a tight first half broke the game open. As Rupp put it immediately after the game, "That is when we put our foot in the bucket." After that, the Miners were in control, and the Wildcats were unable to catch up against a Miner defense that was working perfectly.

While Rupp quibbled that his team had actually outscored the Miners from the field, the edge in foul scoring was a result of desperate Kentucky attempts to climb back from a growing deficit late in the game. The final score was 72-65 in a game that Sports Illustrated termed "a lost cause for Kentucky almost from the start."

But if the championship game itself was a pleasure, certain aftertastes were not so sweet, and they had lingered in El Paso up until the tip-off of the "fun" United Way benefit. Coach Rupp, given time to ruminate on the loss dealt to his "all-time favorite team," spread the rumor that he had lost the national title to "a bunch of crooks." In an interview with Louisville *Courier-Journal* Sports Editor Dave Kindred, printed June 25, 1975, Rupp vented his spleen most directly. While he had been hinting ever since the night of the loss that his boys had "shot their wad" in the Duke game, and had unhappily "saved their worst game of the season until the last," his most recent explanation suggested a pathological depth to his disappointment which understandably aroused UTEP and its backers. In the *Courier-Journal* interview Rupp said that his biggest career disappointment was "...not winning in '66 and finding out Texas Western had all those ineligible players. ... One was on parole from Tennessee State Prison. Two had been kicked out of a junior college in Iowa. Texas Western was suspended by the NCAA for three years after that."

Later in 1975, Neil D. Isaacs, identified as a college professor in accompanying publicity materials, published a book entitled *All The Moves: A History of College Basketball*, available at \$12.95 from Lippincott. In a chapter subtitled



"Team Tokenism Triumphant," Isaacs begins with a discussion of the remarkable success of black colleges in the 1st half of the 20th Century in an attempt to explain the major colleges' ultimate decision to recruit black athletes and thus gain athletic supremacy. Isaacs crowned his discussion of what he called the exploitation of black athletes in America with a recap of the 1966 NCAA championship game, "the best example of the triumph of team tokenism": "Don Haskins' cool recruits calmly won the game at the free-throw line with 28 of 34. There was little in the way of social rewards for them in El Paso, none of them was ever awarded a degree from Texas Western (see foot note attached) and they feel that they have lived out the full meaning of exploitation."

Even Haskins, normally as unperturbed by angry journalism as he is by foreign court hecklers, mused recently that he was surprised that such unfounded and vituperative material continued to surface. After all, a conscientious reporter can easily verify certain facts: Texas Western was not placed on NCAA probation after its 1966 triumph, nor has it been at any time before or since; although David Lattin was a transfer student and did play a year of college basketball at Tennessee A & I, that institution was a college the last time anyone checked; likewise Bobby Joe Hill came to TWC as a transfer student from an Iowa junior college after one year, hardly enough time for anyone to gain an AA degree; and while the diplomas of Harry Flournoy, Nevil Shed, and Willie Cager may in fact bear the title of the The University of Texas at El Paso, it is only because Texas Western College was transformed into university status the year following the NCAA triumph.

In the interest of learning "What are they doing now?" I had made inquiry of the feelings of the players themselves prior to the United Way game. Willie Worsley said that he presently serves as Director of Woddiecrest Child Development and Basketball Camp in New York State. David Lattin plays for the Harlem Globetrotters. Nevil Shed is the Assistant Basketball Coach at the University of Wyoming (and says "I'd love to coach at UTEP someday.") Willie Cager is Recreation and Basketball Supervisor for the Courtsman Recreation Association in Brooklyn. Orsten Artis is a Patrolman for the Gary, Indiana Police Department. Dick Meyers works in the Auditing Department of Farah Manufacturing. Togo Railey is the Head Basketball Coach in Bridge City, Texas. Bobby Joe Hill works in the Purchasing Division of the El Paso Natural Gas Company.

Hill was the only team member questioned who said he ever had occasion to think much about the 1966 Championship or his days as a TWC player. He explained that living in El Paso puts him in contact with a number of fans who like to discuss his career and especially the 1966 season. All the other members of the team said with varying degrees of

enthusiasm that they appreciated their 1966 accomplishment, that in one way or another they had benefited by the experience of being national champions, but that generally the experience of winning the title was no longer a functioning part of their lives. As Willie Cager put it, "Sure I'm glad it happened, but you can't live in the past. I've got very important things to deal with day to day."

No team member could vocalize a regret or drawback concerning their stint on the championship team, nor about playing basketball in general. Cager emphasized that he would have gone to college even without his athletic scholarship but had a far easier time with it. Willie Worsley, who left UTEP a few hours shy of graduation, said emphatically that he could not have gone to college at all without his scholarship.

Most of the players, when questioned about playing for "The Bear," agreed that he was a tough taskmaster, but those still in basketball said that they employed their mentor's techniques every time they came near a court. Lattin, commenting on his role with the Globetrotters, said that Haskin's discipline may have kept him in the game longer than would have been the case otherwise: "I don't get tired of the exhibition format because the Globetrotters didn't come after me to be a clown. I play straight basketball," he said with emphasis.

Flip Baudoin, who graduated from UTEP in 1967 and later received his M.A. from the University of New Mexico, now teaches art and literature at Albuquerque Academy. He added with a grin that he also coaches basketball, grades 6-12. "And I use the same style that Haskins drummed into me," he said. "Sure basketball and the sports establishment in this country has gotten out of hand. There's too much of a big business mentality involved. But basketball can still be fun if you keep it in perspective for your boys. I try to do that."

If then the excitement generated by the return of this championship squad were, only a function of the feelings of the players and the unexpected pleasure of an underdog's win, this article might well end with Baudoin's comment. But there is one other very important human factor to be mentioned, one apart from the players, the coach, and the game itself, which thickened the air of Memorial Gym last July 17. It is an aspect of the human situation clarified by a non-sporting acquaintance of mine who took me aside at a noisy party last summer and waved an empty glass in the general direction of Memorial Gym and downtown El Paso. "The reason everybody still remembers that 1966 game is simple. What else ever put this place in the national eye?" With a glare that communicated impatience with my attempt to find meaning in a basketball game, the acquaintance returned to the milling party.

But I was grateful for the advice, because I realized that one aspect of the

obvious might well be passed on. Implied in the acquaintance's remark was an attitude that is not uncommon to some persons connected with a city, university, firm, or any collective group not nominally recognized as "one of the nation's most important" something or others. The attitude is fondly expressed by one who is explaining why such and such cannot happen at the place in question: "Not enough funding here," or "We don't get the quality of personnel to support that," and so on.

And so I was able, with the unconscious help of the acquaintance, to put my finger on the last of the currents that I had sensed swirling about Memorial Gym last July, currents which combined to toss the clamoring thousands to their feet as Worsley drove for the bucket. Consciously or not, we faithful were applauding not only the magnificent underdog and the triumph of social justice, but something even more deeply rooted: the ability to accomplish a task as well as anyone in the whole wide world without any special advantage, by dint of those simple, Dutch-uncle virtues—discipline, hard work, cooperation, and sacrifice. No stars, no lavish recruiting budget, no heritage of success—just a talented, hard-working group of proud players and a hard-nosed coach.

There they were on that sweltering July court, some of the bellies overflowing their waistbands, sweat streaming, breath coming in great gasps. A living reminder that yes, right here, *here*, it can be done without some cosmic under-the-table assistance. Yes, we are all underfunded, put upon, potentially isolated and even alone... and still we are capable of greatness. So one could interpret the cry of the thousands as "56" Willie Worsley spun, twisted, ducked, and launched into flight, far, far above the arms of all the All-Stars and laid it in, dropped the last piece softly into place.

When Ulysses returned to Ithaca after his many years of wandering, he appeared as a beggar, aged and weak. To rout the suitors who had overrun his home, he would have to slough that infirm shape, string the unstringable bow, and fire his arrow through the twelve impossible rings. Exhausted from his struggles to return, his credit used up with the gods, vastly outnumbered by the young opportunists, Ulysses, the man and not the demi-god, did not waver—he took the bow and did what he had to do.

After the United Way game, another writer asked Worsley jokingly, if he had arranged that finish for the fans. Also smiling, but with a touch of mystery about his eyes, Worsley responded, "I've been saving that play for nine years." For this writer, it was a perfect ending. □

# THE TEACHER CORPS IN CANUTILLO

To understand what Teacher Corps is all about, picture first this scene at Canutillo Elementary School. Leticia Mulhauser is sitting at a small table with Charlene Radach who is administering an individual mental test to Alfredo Quiñones. Rafaela Alvarez has sent Alfredo to be tested. Alfredo is nine years old, extremely small for his age, monolingual Spanish, super-talkative, highly active and friendly, with no previous school experience. Alfredo's mother is poor and recently moved her family to Canutillo from Juarez.

Charlene, administering a section of the test called "picture completion," is showing Alfredo a picture of a table that obviously has one leg missing. She is telling Alfredo, through Leticia, who is translating into Spanish, that "something is missing from this picture. Can you tell me what it is?" Alfredo responds confidently in Spanish, "Sure, there's no food on the table." Alfredo's response, scored according to the test instructions, would be zero.

Charlene shows Alfredo the next picture of a hand with one of the fingernails missing. When asked to name the missing part in this picture, Alfredo responds, again with confidence, "the arm is missing." Charlene, following the administrator's guide for giving the test, responds, "Yes, but what is the most important thing missing?" Alfredo replies, "the arm and shoulder." Again, according to the test scoring manual, this is a zero response. The whole testing process with Alfredo is difficult and follows a similar pattern. The results, if scored according to the test manual, would place Alfredo in one of the lower levels of intelligence. Obviously, from the way he answers the questions, his background from a very poor family with different cultural "values" enters into his responses. But, from the way Alfredo manipulates adults and from the vocabulary he uses, we have to conclude, contrary to test results, that Alfredo is indeed an intelligent young man.

The main characters in this scene and the activity depicted reflect the nature of Teacher Corps and the educational problems it faces. Rafaela Alvarez is one of several teachers at Canutillo taking classes and working with the Teacher Corps project. Leticia Mulhauser is one of four Teacher Corpsmembers who began working at Canutillo in September 1975. She has a B.A. in Spanish and works with a team composed of Jesús Domínguez (B.A., Political Science), Terry Duke (B.A., Political Science), Roberto Jáquez (B.A., Spanish), Carmen Márquez (Team Leader, M.A., Elementary Education), Clifford Whetten (Community Coordinator, M.A., Elementary Education) and the Canutillo teachers and staff. Charlene Radach is a diagnostician working with children who have special needs.

Alfredo Quiñones is an example of the many children at Canutillo who have special needs. The most obvious of his

needs is to learn the language of instruction. At Canutillo this need can be dealt with since a program for training teachers in bilingual instructional techniques was implemented three years ago. Teaching children in English and Spanish or a combination of the two languages is no longer an issue steeped in emotion. Many teachers have dual language facility or are undergoing training to acquire the skills for bilingual instruction. However, a stronger, if more subtle, need is how to channel Alfredo's energy, intelligence, and cultural orientation into meaningful learning activity. Should Alfredo's response—that food on the table rather than the table leg is the most important thing missing from the picture—be weighed as a deficit or counted as a plus? How do we channel his ability to deal with and “size up” people, particularly adults, into social skills that can be productive for him in a new bicultural surrounding? In short, how can the school system meet the complex and special needs of the many Alfredos? The Teacher Corps project at UT El Paso and Canutillo Elementary School is working on arriving at the best possible solutions to the problems of children like Alfredo.

The Teacher Corps, established by Congress in 1965, is a nationwide effort to provide children from low-income families better educational opportunities and to improve the quality of teacher education programs for both inexperi-

enced teacher interns and certified teachers. Teacher Corps offers school districts in low-income areas, their communities, and nearby universities the chance to work together, plan, and operate innovative two-year programs for better training and utilization of teachers. The Teacher Corps project at UT El Paso began in June 1971 when several school districts and the University decided that the Teacher Corps might help them achieve changes they wanted and needed. Working together they developed a project proposal. Students, teachers, and community members participated in the proposal preparation process. The proposals outlined the objectives for change in the University, the community, and the schools, as well as the academic instruction that would be offered and the amount of funds sought.

The 1971 proposal found UT El Paso working with the Ysleta and the El Paso Independent School Districts in four different schools with 30 interns over a two-year period. The 30 interns had undergraduate degrees in fields other than education and were registered at UT El Paso for a two-year sequence of coursework and on-site activity. Each of the Corpsmember interns was assigned to a school in a basic unit called the “team.” The Teacher Corps interns spent a full 12-hour day with activities in the school, the University, and the community for a period of two years. The intern was prepared academically by the University, received practical on-the-job experience in the school, and learned responsiveness to the complex needs of children and their families through work in the community.

Since the 6th Cycle (the Corps was established in 1965), which was the first two-year period that Teacher Corps was funded in the El Paso area, two subsequent cycles have been funded. The 6th Cycle processed 28 Corpsmember interns who graduated with Master's degrees in May, 1973. The 8th Cycle, working with five different school districts and seven different schools in the El Paso area, graduated 30 Corpsmember interns with Master's degrees in May, 1975. The 10th Cycle got underway June 1, 1975, and currently has four Corpsmembers working in one school, Canutillo Independent School District, with a different aim than the previous two cycles, resulting from the excess of teacher graduates nationwide. The new focus is on retraining service teachers to work more advantageously with low-income children. The focus has also been broadened to include responding to all the child's individual needs. In effect, the aim is to train teachers as counselors. Research has shown that the most effective teachers have the ability to listen to children, to understand children, and to work with that child's parents as his primary educators. Good teachers are people experts

first, and reading, math and science experts second.

Another new aspect of Teacher Corps' process is to change the method of education by placing the university professor on-site—in UT El Paso's case, Canutillo Elementary School—to work side-by-side with the teacher in the classroom. In this situation, the professor can observe children's behavior, observe the daily routines of the teacher, and then work with the teacher to provide a better overall classroom learning situation. For instance, the statistics course, a headache for most people who go through the teacher training program, will be taught on-site by Dr. Stanley Ball. Dr. Ball will take the first few sessions to teach the teachers a common language in statistics and then will work with them on actual classroom problems at Canutillo that can be related to his statistics course. This on-site instruction aspect in the program involves considerable risk for many of the professors in that: (1) they must be able to apply theory to the actual situation and their pet theory may not be appropriate, (2) they must be able to show the teacher that they can work with kids and their real live behavior, and (3) it's much harder work and considerably less comfortable than the college classroom and office environment of the University campus.

In addition to Dr. Ball, Dr. Soledad Gurrola is teaching bilingual reading; Dr. Max Plata is teaching special education; Dr. Dan Kies is teaching social studies and early childhood; Dr. Bob Slettedahl is teaching elementary school guidance and mental hygiene; Francisco Gurrola is teaching Spanish; and various resource consultants are working with the Teacher Corps staff on special workshops for teachers, interns, teacher aides, and parents.

Initially, Teacher Corps, like its foreign counterpart, the Peace Corps, came under fire because interns were oriented to be "agents of change." In the El Paso area, interns without previous experience in the classroom or knowledge of educational methods were placed in schools with experienced cooperating teachers. The intern, armed only with the "change agent orientation" and considerable enthusiasm, proceeded to try to change the experienced teacher's way of relating to children and her methods of teaching. In some cases, experienced teachers really needed to change their methods and other cases their existing methods and ways of relating were highly effective. In all cases, interns met resistance because they didn't really know what needed changing. Teacher Corps experience nationwide, as well as locally, has shown that the most effective way for interns to bring about change in systems is to first gain acceptance and experience in the classroom and then work with the experienced teacher in bringing about needed changes. The early criticism of Teacher Corps did not curtail its effectiveness in training outstanding teachers or in having some meaningful impact on the school, the community, and the University. The most significant indicator of successful training of teachers has to be the current placement of the 60 individuals who have graduated from the Teacher Corps program at UT El Paso. The majority of 6th Cycle graduates are in leadership positions in education and many of the 8th Cycle graduates are working in specialized areas in education or in leadership positions. Three of the 6th Cycle graduates, Dennis Bixler, Jesús Cortez, and Andrés Príncipe, are doctoral candidates at Stanford University, Oregon State University, and University of Houston re-

spectively. Several of the 6th Cycle graduates were employed by the El Paso Public Schools. Joe Banales is Assistant Principal at Mesa Vista School while Ernestine Benegas is an early childhood consultant with the El Paso Public Schools. Ramy Martínez and Santiago Rodríguez are directors of reading laboratories at the El Paso Community College, while Ruth Martínez is the director of a bilingual program in San Francisco, California. Cecilia Marmelejo, from 6th Cycle, is Director of the Right-to-Read Program for adults in Denver, Colorado, and Clifford Whetten is Community Coordinator and Director of the Community-Based Education School at Canutillo.

The 8th Cycle Teacher Corps graduates were trained in the same areas of bilingual - multicultural education and reading, with 28 of the 30 graduates receiving at least two unsolicited contract offers. Several of these 28 graduates received four to six unsolicited contract offers for their services. Zoe Ann Hayes is currently in a doctoral program at Stanford University in bilingual/bicultural education. Manuel Jiménez is the director of a reading laboratory at Western New Mexico University in Silver City, and Steve Oliver works for a multicultural training project at The University of Texas at Austin. María Gómez is a reading teacher at El Paso Community College, while Francisco Gurrola, Martin Jacquez and Frank Rodríguez are reading specialists with Gadsden Independent School District. Glenn Ratcliffe Jr. and Margarita Peña are bilingual reading specialists with the Anthony, Texas I.S.D., while Gilbert Gutiérrez, Oscar Pérez, and Mario Rodríguez are bilingual reading specialists with the San Diego Public Schools in California. Bill Kayser is a bilingual reading specialist with the Nogales, Arizona, school system. The remainder of the 8th Cycle Teacher Corps graduates, Jesús Armandariz, Eva Díaz, Enrique Garay, Federico Martínez, Irma Domínguez, David Salazar, Manuel Soto Jr. and Carmen Morales were placed in bilingual and/or reading teaching positions in the El Paso, Ysleta, Fort Hancock, and Fabens Independent School Districts.

In the face of rising excesses of people trained as teachers at the national level, one has to ask, "What are the significant factors that contribute to the demand for the Teacher Corps graduates from UT El Paso?" Probably the most cogent factor has to be the recruitment and selection of highly motivated individuals. While Corpsmember interns meet the same entrance requirements as other students to the Graduate School, the screening committee pays particularly close attention to the desire of the potential intern to be involved in the teaching-learning process of children from low-income families. The second factor is that the Corpsmember intern is expected to devote his full attention to his Teacher Corps activities which include taking courses, instructing youngsters in the classroom, and working with parents in the community. In return for this activity, he is given a stipend of \$120 a week plus \$15 for each dependent in addition to having all of his books, tuition and fees paid by the Project. A third significant factor is the concentration of instructional time and effort here at the University devoted to Corpsmembers and the teachers who work with them at the various school sites. The 10th Cycle Teachers Corps intern, when he completes the two-years phase of instruction, will end up with approximately 70 hours of college work in addition to his B.A. degree as well as logging half a day every day in the classroom and another 15 hours a week in community activity.

Dr. Larry Hamilton, Director, and Dr. Alma Barba, Program Development Specialist, are charged with the responsibility of implementing the Teacher Corps project. Able assistance and excellent cooperation is achieved through the efforts of Mr. Harry Segapeli, the Superintendent of Canutillo I.S.D. and its community members, Eleonor Nicolls, Site Coordinator, and some 50 teachers. Dr. Norma Hernández, Dr. Joe Klingstedt, Dr. E. E. Davis, Dr. Hilmar Wagner and Dr. Rudolph Gómez along with many of the faculty and staff provide excellent support and resource activity for the Project. □

## INTER-UNIVERSITY PACT

A historic agreement to conduct joint research on environmental pollution problems was signed on Jan. 22, 1976. The pact marked the first time such an arrangement had ever been made between educational institutions from both countries.

The allies in the pact are the University of Texas at El Paso and three institutions in Juárez, México: the Universidad Autónoma, the Instituto Tecnológico Regional, and the Escuela Superior de Agricultura "Hermanos Escobar." Their agreement was to share whatever resources and data are available among the four institutions and to exchange and better educate their students and faculty in the common cause of eliminating a growing pollution problem along the U.S. - Mexico border.

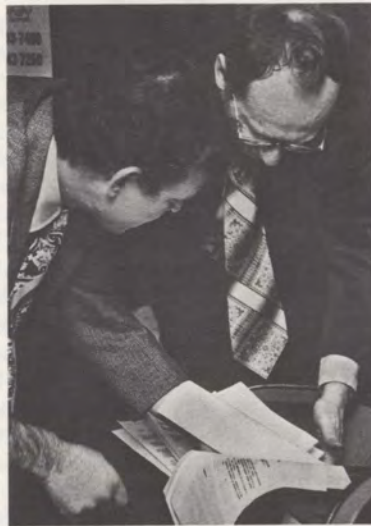
The ground work for the agreement was actually laid back in September, 1973, when UT El Paso hosted the First Binational Symposium on Air Pollution Along the U.S. - Mexico Border. A binational committee was formed at that time under the auspices of the El Paso field office of the Pan American Health Organization. The cooperation that characterized the first symposium carried over to a second conference in Nuevo Laredo in 1975. Their progress led organizers to the establishment of a permanent pact, culminated by the recent signing of the document in the El Paso offices of the Pan American Health Organization.

The director of the University's Center for Inter-American Studies, Robert L. Peterson, said the institutions would investigate all aspects of the pollution problem. "So far all our efforts have been conducted in a harmonious atmosphere and the cooperation of the Mexican government has been exceptional," Dr. Peterson said.

Dr. Howard Applegate, UTEP environmental engineer serving as technical advisor for the University, said the four institutions could now cover a broader spectrum of problems and solutions than any one institution could on its own. "To the man in the street and to the taxpayer," Dr. Applegate added, "the agreement means an improvement of the environment at less cost for research.

"Basically, it means a longer and happier life for all of us." □

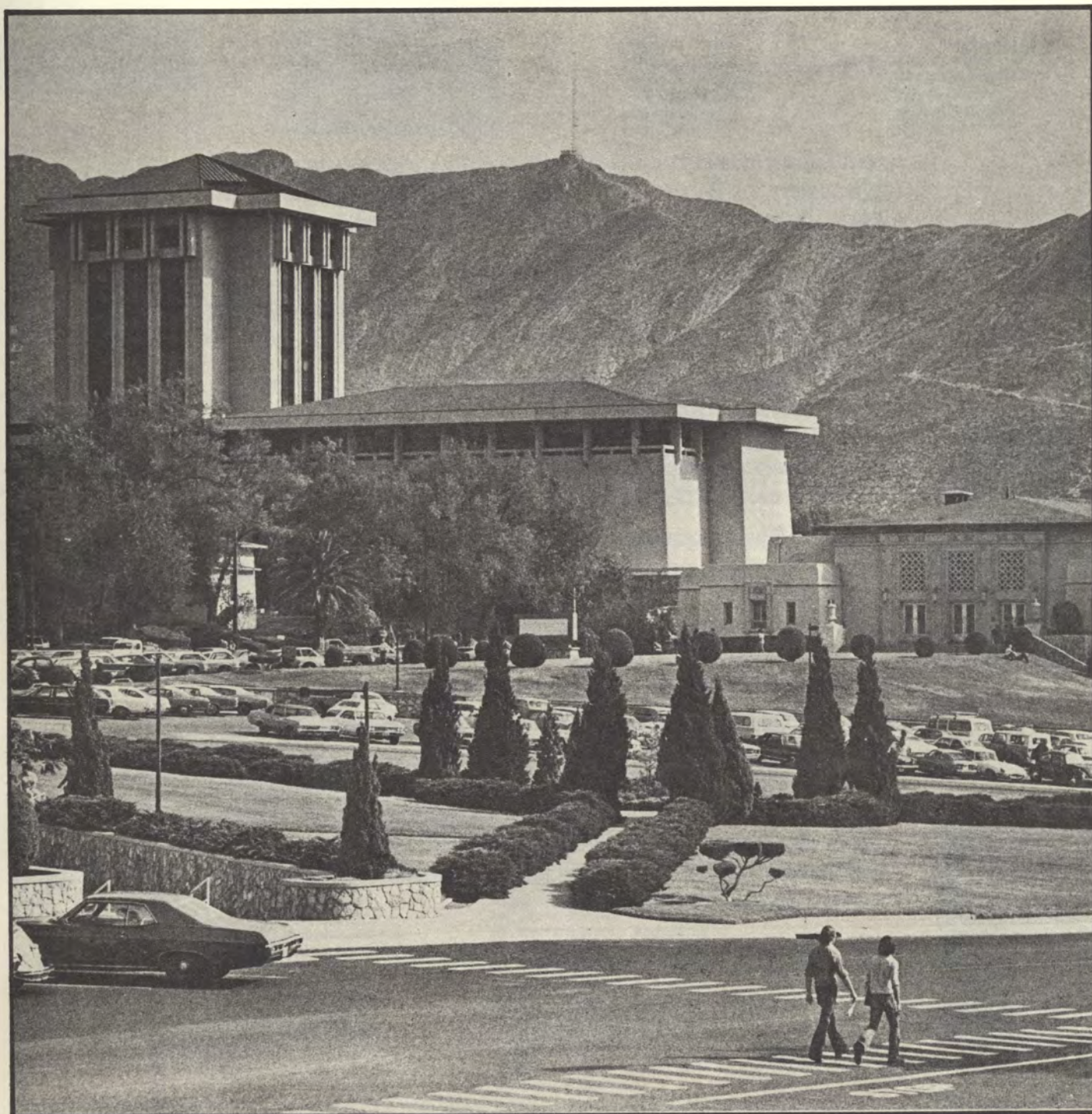

to all alumni and friends who responded generously to The University of Texas at El Paso's appeal in calendar year 1975. Your gifts of cash, securities, equipment, and books totaled \$634,123 — a figure some 12 percent greater than last year's contributions, and the largest increase in any past year with the exception of 1971, when UTEP was the recipient of the Josephine Clardy Fox bequest.

The significant dollar totals are broken down in this way: Corporate support totaled \$151,741 and alumni and friends contributed \$482,382. One very significant figure is an upsurge in alumni support which was up 43 percent in 1975 over that contributed in 1974 — from \$67,852 to \$96,612.

There was also an increase in the number of donors during 1975. The 2,903 contributors listed here constitute a larger group than in any previous Fund year. Alumni contributions were received from a record 2,598 individuals; The Matrix Society increased its membership to 281; and The President's Associates increased its membership to 58.

The Development Board and our University President A. B. Templeton extend their thanks to the many volunteer workers who gave much of their time to the assistance of the University in 1975, and to the generous friends — individuals, businesses, professional groups, clubs, churches, and associations — who contributed this essential financial support to the University.



# THE DEVELOPMENT BOARD

The Development Board is dedicated to promote the recognition, welfare and progress of the University. It is composed of 25 leading business, professional and civic leaders who are appointed for three-year terms by the Board of Regents after nomination by the University's president. Their primary responsibility is to serve as liaison between the University and the community and, upon request, to assist or advise the President.



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# THE PRESIDENT'S ASSOCIATES

The President's Associates recognizes those friends and alumni who give substantial support to the University. Membership is by invitation and is accorded individuals who contribute a minimum of \$500 in cash or securities to academic programs during a calendar year. Since its beginning in 1969, The President's Associates has grown steadily. In 1975, there were 58 memberships.

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The following are firms and their foundations which contributed cash and securities of \$100 or more to the University's academic programs in 1975. BUSINESS ASSOCIATES are firms that contributed \$1,000 or more. BUSINESS PATRONS gave between \$500 and \$999, BUSINESS SPONSORS gave from \$250 to \$499, and BUSINESS CONTRIBUTORS gave between \$100 and \$249.

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The Matrix Society's purposes are to promote the general welfare of the University by stimulating greater interest in and understanding of its purposes and programs and broadening the base of annual alumni financial support; and, to give suitable recognition to those alumni whose support and interest are above the average. New memberships totaled 73 in 1975 bringing the total membership to 281 — an all-time record.

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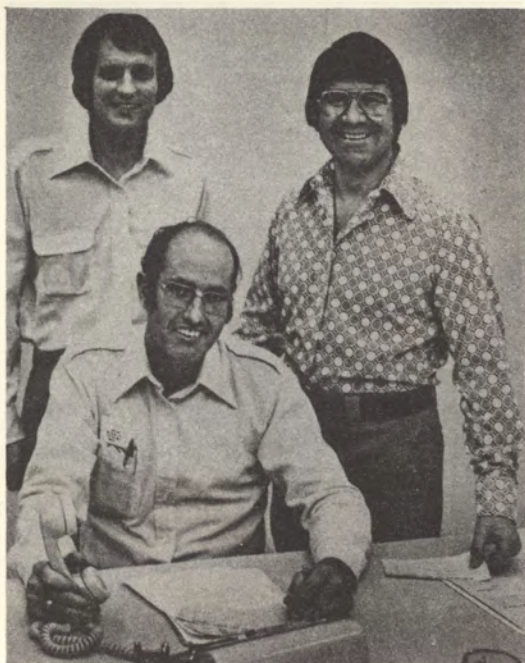

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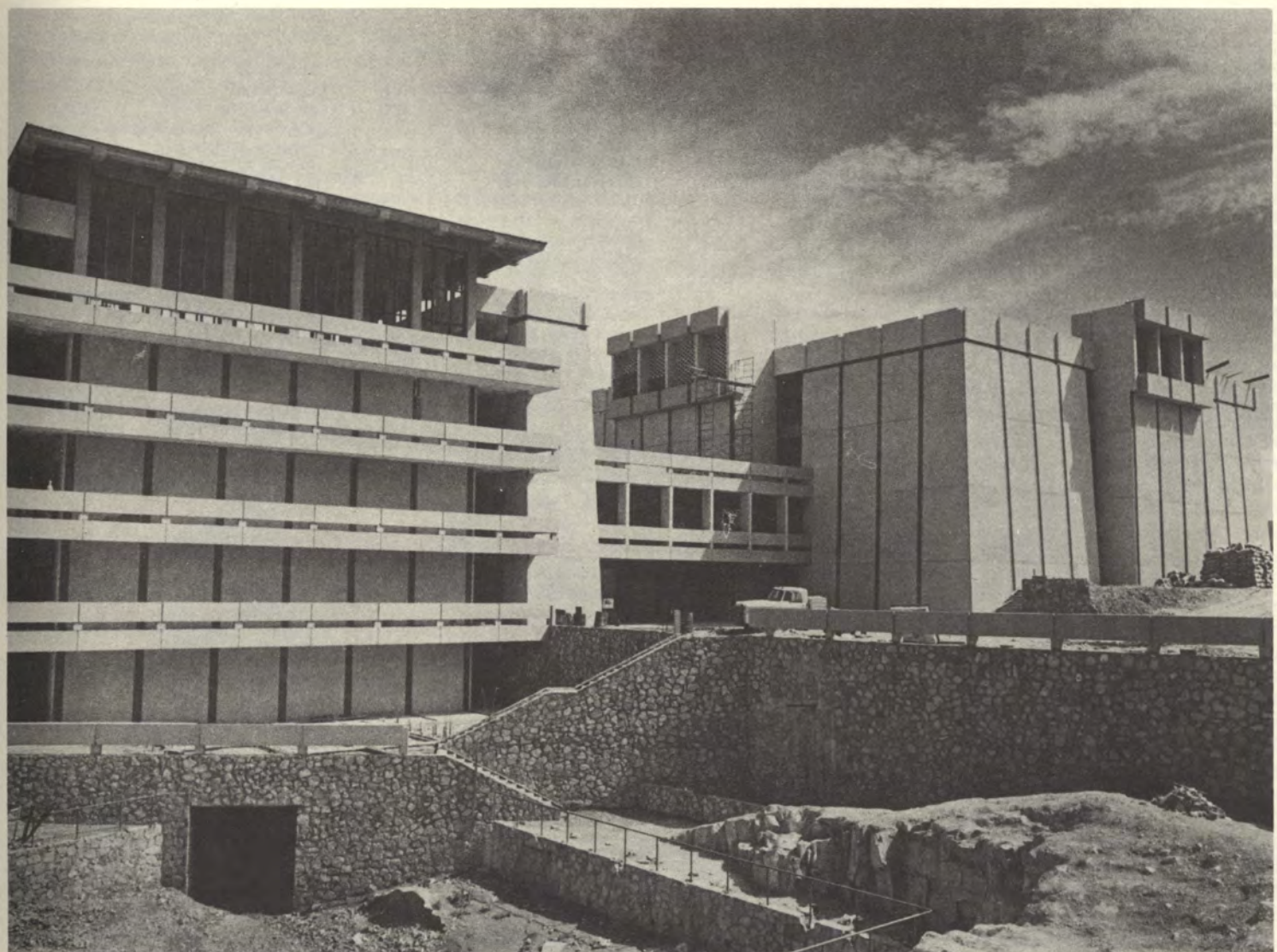
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# On the Trail of Roger de Flor in Turkey

When Dr. John Hernández and I reached the ancient city of Istanbul in August, 1973, we each arrived harboring long-standing dreams. We were scheduled to spend a year as visiting professors at Bogazici Universitesi, or the University of the Bosphorus, built on forested hill tops overlooking one of the most beautiful waterways of the world.

As a young Navy officer twenty years before, my husband had visited the century-old engineering college, then known as Robert College in honor of the American philanthropist who had helped to found it. After exploring the ivy-hung stone buildings of the institution, reminiscent of a venerable New England campus, and talking to the members of the international faculty, who were training most of the engineers and technologists for the Middle East, he promised himself that he would return someday to show me that magic spot on the boundary of Europe and Asia. The opportunity came with his first sabbatical leave from New Mexico State University and a National Science Foundation grant for research on the staggering problems of sewage disposal for the three million inhabitants of the city.

My own dream was centered on the manuscript I carried in my hand luggage: my translation, the first in English, of a 17th century classic of Spanish literature, Francisco de Moncada's *Expedición de los catalanes y aragoneses contra los turcos y griegos*. Before publishing the work, I wanted to follow the route of the notorious band of northern Spanish mercenaries, from Constantinople, the capital of the Byzantine Empire, across the Sea of Marmara and into the Aegean provinces of Anatolia. I needed to check the geography and place names of a remote part of the Mediterranean region that my chronicler, Moncada, had never himself approached. I was also eager to see any remaining signs and landmarks from the time of the Catalan Company. We were delighted to discover that 25 centuries of human history, and more, are clearly preserved in modern Turkey like a fly caught in amber.

We entered the Istanbul of the Turks through the towering stone walls that were completed in 330 A.D. by Emperor Constantine. Rickety, two-storied, unpainted frame houses leaned against the palisades, as they did six centuries ago in 1302 when Roger de Flor reached the gates at the head of 8,000 soldiers from Catalonia. They had just come from Sicily, where for many years they had been in the service of the Spanish king Fadrique II of the House of Aragon. Since an idle army, however glorious and victorious, soon becomes a nuisance and burden to any government, Fadrique had prudently arranged for their employment, as far away as possible, by another monarch in need of military aid: Emperor Andronicus Palaeologus of the Roman Empire of the East.

We explored the splendid location of the Blachernae Palace at the upper end of the estuary of the Golden Horn and the area of Constantinople, as the city was called until this century, that is still known as Pera—"the other side" in Greek, where the Catalans were quartered among the other Latin foreigners, and where most of the Europeans of the metropolis still live today. Then we followed Roger, the 34-year-old adventurer

who already had a flamboyant career with the Knights Templar behind him, over the Sea of Marmara to the great Anatolian peninsula. He had disembarked at Cyzicus, a neck of land that pokes northward into the inland sea from the Asia Side. He had wintered there with his forces before plunging into the mountains of Asia Minor in search of the wily Turkish tribesmen, who were pressing Emperor Andronicus more sharply each year. Roger's mission was to beat back this threat from the Caucasus and eastward toward Persia. The Turks had been migrating gradually southward for centuries from their origin in the Altus Mountains between Russia and China.

We followed the trail of the Catalans south through the ancient Anatolian kingdoms of Mysia and Phrygia, taking notes and photographs of the ruins of golden-age Greek cities and medieval bastions where the Catalans had fought, conquered, and rested on their ferocious progress. These rugged warriors, many of whom were the savage footsoldiers called *almugávares* from the northern provinces of the Iberian peninsula, specialized in swift, surprise attacks and open-field confrontations. Our predecessors had trudged or ridden mounted-up and down the old stone Roman roads or dim camel-caravan trails to their rendezvous with the proud lords of Islam. But Johnny and I traveled by comfortable wide-windowed buses; in crammed Turkish taxis called *dolmushes*, which aptly means "stuffed"; or in our own minuscule Triumph convertible. The contemporary roads, even in interior areas, were generally well designed, often by Robert College engineers, and adequately maintained except when the damage of freezing weather and heavy rains was too recent. But the ways were always covered by the unhurried flow of Turkish peasants, in flatbed, horse-drawn carts, atop pyramidal saddles aboard donkeys, in wide trailers pulled by tractors, or walking along with herds of sheep, hairy musk oxen, or occasional strings of smelly, linked camels.



We looked down on modern Manisa from the crumbled walls of the old Magnesia citadel where Roger held out against the Turkish chieftain, Karaman. We examined the battlefield of Philadelpia, present manufacturing city of Alashehir, where traces of first-century Greek villages and the tombs of much earlier Hittites are still visible. Farther east and deeper into the Taurus Mountains, as far into the Anatolian peninsula as Roger penetrated, we came across Kula, which means "fortress," a small walled city where Roger had cut off the governor's head. Then we followed the trail up the Maeander River to Nicaea, now Iznik, where the Christian bishops had convened in the fourth century to construct a unified dogma that is now known as the Nicene Creed. When Roger's men found the Hagia Sophia there, a now sunken church where the council had taken place, they recognized an important Christian landmark but did not realize that all the dissenters from the majority opinion on that famous occasion had remained behind in the church—in tombs.

Our most impressive vista, shared with Roger and his blood-thirsty Catalans, opened up as we moved south again through the olive groves and vegetable gardens along the Aegean Sea, as smooth and "wine-dark" as Homer describes it. There on a sudden steep rise looms a vast, blank-walled fortress, overlooking the magnificent city of Ephesus, where Paul of Tarsus wrote the letters to his congregation that became fundamental documents for the new Christian faith that he was energetically propagating. In the early 14th century the luxurious Greek port, with its great public baths, marble library, shopping centers, wide stone-paved streets, and mural-painted houses was already deep in decline. Its harbors had silted up and its commerce had moved to other wharfs. The mercenary army, pious Catholics all, searched out the basilica of St. John to worship at one of the great shrines of Christendom. But they were still looters by profession, making off with the prize relic, the mummified hand of the Evan-

gelist. In subsequent centuries this treasure was often a political pawn between kings and Popes; we saw it resting in its silver sheath in a modest glass display case of the Topkapi Palace at Istanbul. The Catalans passed unknowingly by the small stone cottage on the edge of the city that is now a major tourist attraction. The legend that it was the last home of Mary, the mother of Jesus, was not current then.

After two years of rampaging through the provinces, destroying or frightening off Turks, and extracting unpaid wages from the "liberated" populace, the Spaniards returned to Constantinople. From there the redoubtable Roger de Flor was summoned to a consultation about future expeditions by the joint emperor, Andronicus' son, Michael IX, crowned by custom during his father's lifetime to avoid any uncertainty of succession. The younger ruler's court was established at Adrianople in Thrace, now Edirne on the Bulgarian border, more than a hundred miles from the capital. Against the urgent advice of his nobles and his young wife, Maria, herself a member of the Palaeologus family, Roger went to the meeting accompanied only by a small bodyguard. In April of 1305 he was murdered there at a banquet in the Emperor's palace. Edirne now holds great architectural monuments from the Is-

lamic era that began in 1453, but only fragmentary ruins remain of Michael's castle.

After the death of their leader, the Company retreated westward from Constantinople along the coast of the Sea of Marmara, stopping first to regroup at the town of Rhodestos, now Tekirdag, where many of them were treacherously killed. Our last journey in pursuit of their traces took us to Gallipoli on the long peninsula that forms the north side of the strait known as the Hellespont or the Dardanelles. We examined the great bastions near the water's edge that they fortified and held for years, until they moved over to Athens. There the handful of remaining Spaniards ruled the Greek capital for more than seventy years.

Johnny and I left Istanbul in August, 1974, during a convenient cease-fire in the current Greek-Turkish conflict over Cyprus. It was the latest manifestation of the age-old enmity between these two ethnic groups that the rootless Catalans had come to exploit 600 years before. My manuscript of *Moncada*, illumined by notes and photographs from the scenes of his narrative, was soon ready for the Texas Western Press as *The Catalan Chronicle of Francisco de Moncada*, when we were home from the shores of the Bosphorus—one of the loveliest spots of the earth. □

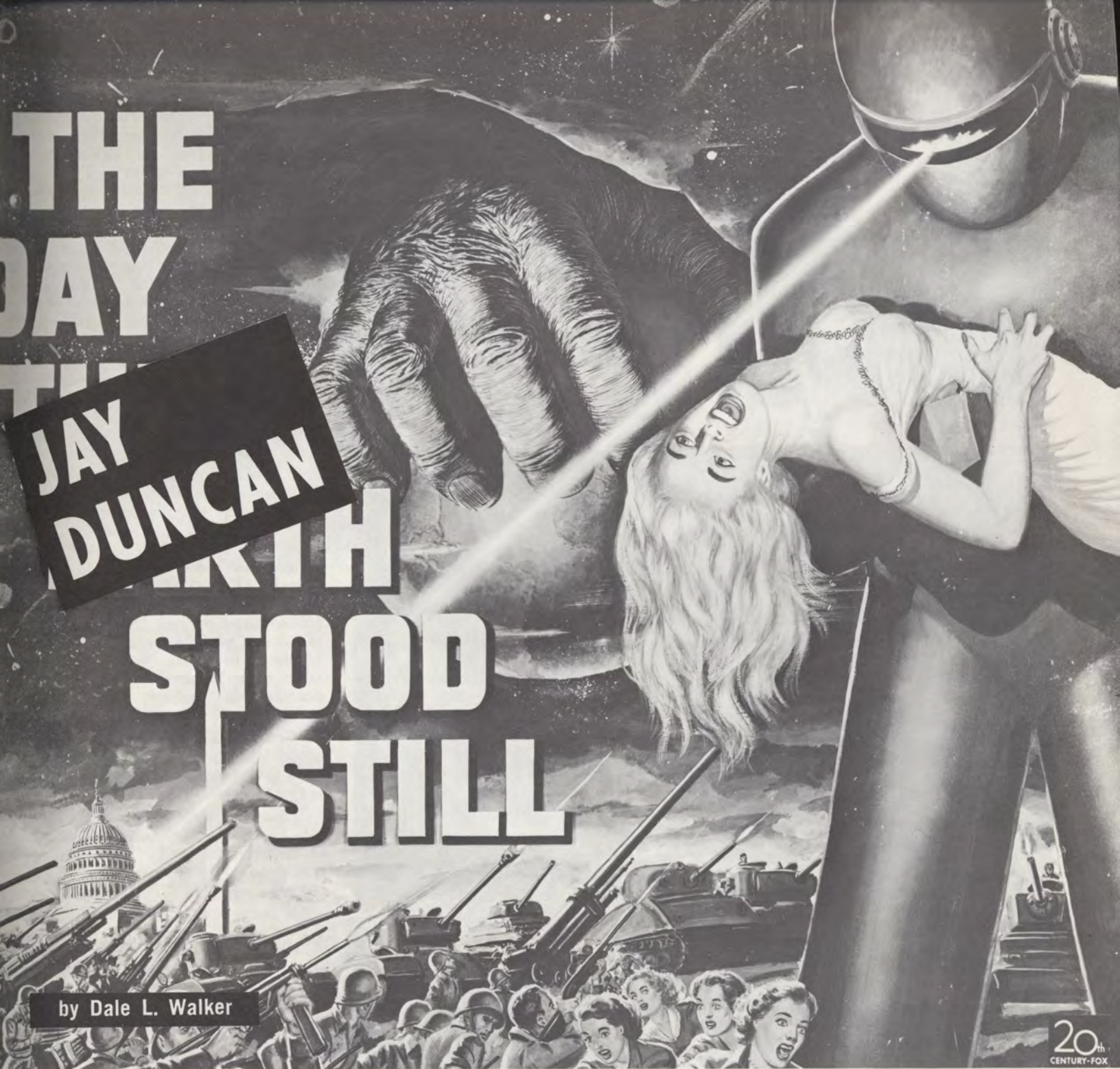

# THE DAY THE EARTH STOOD STILL

"Hey, you a ham operator?"

"No."

"Fraternity boy?"

"No."

"Well, what the hell does your license plate mean anyway?"

"Oh, it's the name of a man from outer space."

"Uh-huh. Well, that's nice. See you around."

When Jay Duncan drives around in his maroon Mustang GT-302, people ask about his license plate. It says KLAATU. When he tells them what it means, most suddenly remember they are late for an appointment somewhere. The few who know what it means—well, they know.

Actually we got Jay Duncan to stand still for two or three long interviews, not a full day, although even that length of time would have been insufficient. With

Jay you can go on forever. One problem is that an interview tends to trail off into movie trivia—one of the most interesting subjects in the world.

"Okay, Jay, Michael Rennie played Klaatu in 'The Day the Earth Stood Still.' Who else was in it?"

"Patricia Neal, Billy Gray (the kid from 'Father Knows Best'), Sam Jaffe played the mathematician, Hugh Marlowe was Patricia Neal's fiancé. He was the fink of the film."

"A terrific fink, almost as good as Hume Cronyn. Remember Cronyn in the prison films? With Joe Sawyer, Jr., and Barton McLane? Let's get back on the subject." (Slyly) "Who played the robot?"

"Gort? It was a guy named Lock Martin."

"No kidding. Lock? Like Tab-Hunter, a Hollywood name."

"Like Rock Hudson."

"Biff Elliott."

"Troy Donohue."

"Rip Torn. Only I think that's real."

"Kitty Litter."

"Rex Reason?"

"His brother is Rhodes Reason. Not a bad actor."

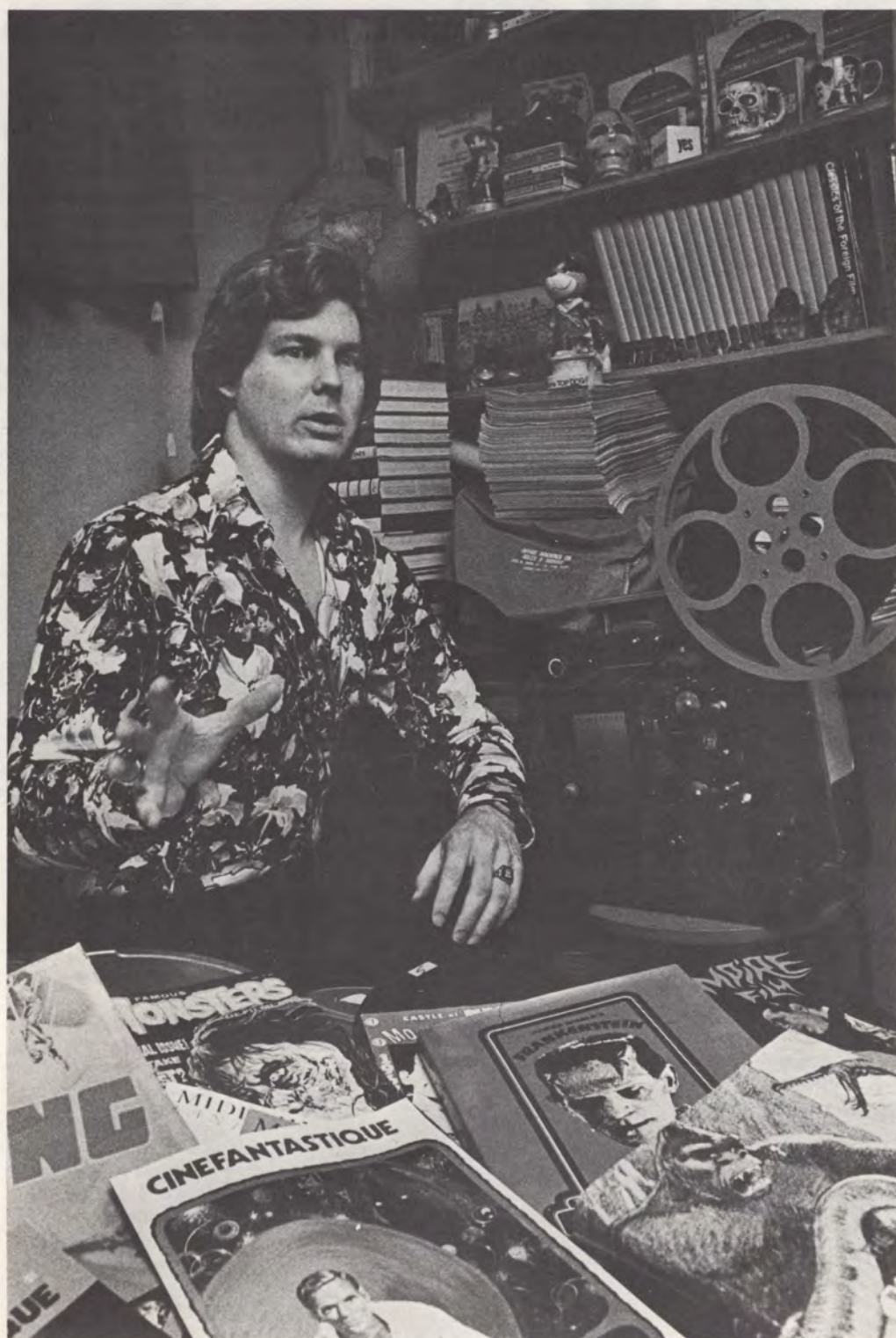
"Efrem Zimbalist, Jr.? That must be real. By the way, whatever happened to Turhan Bey?"

But when we do get down to it, James Carl "Jay" Duncan III, 1971 UTEP graduate (B.A., Mass Communication), age 28, program director for the Plaza Theater Corp. and El Paso Plaza of the Performing Arts, becomes more than a film buff and collector. He is a serious student of film, particularly of horror and

science fiction-fantasy film. And, since horror and fantasy films naturally range from the sublime to the ridiculous, Jay's film interest and knowledge so ranges.

He remembers in detail all the *schlock* of the genre, from the 1950s' craze of atomic mutations—giant spiders, ants, scorpions, praying mantises—to the Japanese Godzilla vs. King Kong atrocities. He can laugh about these wobbly, guy-wire wonders, comparing them to the sheer genius of Ray Harryhausen's creature in "The Beast From 20,000 Fathoms" (1953), but he likes them both. Most of us do, it is just that most of us don't want *others* to know we like them.

When it comes to horror and fantasy film, Jay is liberal. His idea of truly damning condemnation is to say "It was in bad taste."

He loves old German cinema. Fritz Lang ("Metropolis," 1926) is a special hero, Robert Wiene ("The Cabinet of Dr. Caligari," 1919) another, and Jay can give you a splendid analysis of the old, original Dracula movie, "Nosferatu," made in Germany in 1922 starring Max Schreck as "Count Orlock." It was inspired by Bram Stoker's classic novel but Orlock is a totally hideous creature, more animal than human, the incarnation of pestilence, with rats and bugs swarming wherever he walks. Bela Lugosi might later have inspired sympathy for his portrayal of Dracula; Schreck inspires revulsion.

"Getting back to 'The Day the Earth Stood Still,' Jay, you say this is your all-time favorite science fiction film. Why is that?"

"I identify with Klaatu—Michael Rennie—and it is a very believable film with an important message. Everything about it is done well and with taste."

"Who wrote it?"

"It came from a short story by Harry Bates called 'Farewell to the Master,' which had a far different ending than the film version. Edmund H. North wrote the screenplay. He also wrote the 'Patton' screenplay, so he is no slouch. Robert Wise was director. He was an editor on 'Citizen Kane,' and directed 'West Side Story,' 'The Sound of Music,' 'Andromeda Strain.'"

"The trouble is, Jay, you don't have these answers right at your fingertips..."

"Would you like to know who wrote the music? Bernard Herrmann who wrote the music for 'Psycho' and 'Citizen Kane' and Harryhausen's films."

He has a special interest and very near definitive knowledge of the French film-maker Georges Méliés who made 4,000 short films in the early 1900's. Méliés, a tragic figure, was the first to produce a film with an actual story-line ("Cinderella"), first to devise the fade-in and fade-out and dissolve techniques, first to experiment with fantasy films—"A Trip to the Moon" in 1902, "Conquest of the Pole" in 1912. Méliés died penniless, his last job that of selling toys in a Marseilles railway station in the 1930's.

Jay Duncan's first brush with fantasy

film came in 1951 when he saw—you guessed it—"The Day the Earth Stood Still" in a drive-in theater with his parents. In the 25 years since, that low-budget little masterpiece is still his favorite, but little else has remained static. He has managed, and it is anything but an easy thing to do in El Paso, Texas, to make a career out of his filmic devotion.

"What was the password Patricia Neal was to tell Gort to keep him from destroying the world, Jay?"

"*'Klaatu—barada—nikto.'* And by the way, if you look at this film as many times as I have, there are a lot of Biblical parallels in it. Also I am writing a magazine piece about it comparing it to 'Shane'—there are a lot of similarities between the two and both are classic films in two totally different genres."

"You met the director, didn't you?"

"Yes. I went down to Shafter, Texas in February, 1970, when they were filming 'Andromeda Strain,' (1971) and met Robert Wise—a very fine man. 'Andromeda' was his first return to science fiction since 'Day the Earth Stood Still' and it was a fine film. He gave me a souvenir, the key that James Olson wore around his neck which de-activated the nuclear device that would have destroyed 'Project Wildfire'."

"*'Klaatu—barada—nikto.'* I have to remember that."

Jay Duncan has put together, since seriously starting it in 1962, one of the finest collections of fantasy-horror movie memorabilia in the country: 2,500 movie stills and negatives dating from 1902 (Méliés' "Trip to the Moon"), over 1,000 "frame blow-ups" including every important frame of "King Kong," "The War of the Worlds," "This Island Earth," "Forbidden Planet," "20 Million Miles to Earth," "The 7th Voyage of Sinbad," "The Time Machine," and "Curse of the Werewolf"; posters, one-sheets (27 x 41-inch posters), lobby cards, window inserts, newspaper mats, press books, film books, paperback tie-in books, soundtrack music, props, correspondence with people in the industry, and 8 and 16 mm. films.

He has been an attending member of the World Science Fiction Committee since 1968; film advisor to several film and science fiction conventions around the country including Solarcon I, held in 1975 in El Paso, first s-f convention ever held in the city, and for the upcoming Solarcon II, to be held April 16-18 at the Plaza Theater in downtown El Paso. He also serves annually as teaching assistant and expert in the accredited UTEP course, "Introduction to Film Theory and Criticism—the Science Fiction Film," taught by Dr. Les Standiford at the Plaza Theater. (Professional guests at this annual, popular, course have included Robert Bloch—author of 'Psycho' and many other works, and Fritz Leiber, the science fiction writer.)

At the Plaza Theater, Jay is in charge of all film programming, all public relations work and publicity. He was one of the original trio of El Pasoans forming in 1973 a "Save the Plaza" committee—with Lane Robertson and Mrs. Julia Breck. And he is a member of the Board of Directors, and Secretary-Treasurer of the El Paso Plaza Theater Corp., also a member of Alpha Epsilon Rho (National Honorary Radio-TV fraternity) and Kappa Kappa Psi (National Honorary Band fraternity.)

Prior to the Plaza Theater connection, Jay worked at KROD-KDBC TV in El Paso as film editor, cameraman, audio-man, and director.

"Jay, has any film ever really frightened you?"

"One. William Castle's 'Mr. Sardonicus,' released in 1961. It had Oscar Homolka in it. The old theme of 'a clown at midnight,' if handled well, is pretty scary."

"What's your all-time favorite film—of any kind?"

Frank Capra's 'It's a Wonderful Life,' made in 1946 with James Stewart, Donna Reed, Lionel Barrymore, Thomas Mitchell, Ward Bond. I think it's better than 'Citizen Kane.' Capra gambled on it and it won several Oscar nominations. It's both Capra's and Jimmy Stewart's favorite film. Few people seem to remember it—it has to do with a man who wishes he were dead and a guardian angel who shows him the effect it would have on his town if he had never been born."

"Which studio was responsible for most of the horror and s-f classics?"

"Universal Pictures. They made the 'Invisible Man,' 'Wolf Man,' 'Frankenstein,' 'Dracula,' and 'Mummy' films, 'Creature from the Black Lagoon,' the big insect and mutant movies. They also made 'This Island Earth' in 1955 which

is certainly one of the finest science fiction films ever. It had Jeff Morrow, Rex Reason, Faith Domergue in it and a \$17,000 mutant that stows away on a spaceship.

"What are some of your other favorites?"

"Well, I like 'The Thing,' made in 1951 by RKO and produced by Howard Hawks, based on John Campbell's story 'Who Goes There?' I like Stephen Spielberg's work too—'Jaws,' 'The Sugarland Express' and that fine TV movie 'Due' with Dennis Weaver, based on a Richard Watheson story. Spielberg's new film is 'Close Encounter of the Third Kind' and I'm anxious to see it."

"George Pal?"

"Yes, anything at all by George Pal and Ray Harryhausen. These are two masters of imaginative cinema. I never get tired of Pal's work—'War of the Worlds,' 'When Worlds Collide,' 'The Seven Faces of Dr. Lao,' 'Destination Moon,' and the new one, 'Doc Savage.' Same thing with Harryhausen—'Seventh Voyage of Sinbad,' 'Golden Voyage of Sinbad,' 'The Beast from 20,000 Fathoms'—anything by either man is bound to be good."

On the evening of the last interview, Jay phoned me at home:

"His name was actually Turhan Selahattin Sahultavy Bey. He was born in 1920 and is described as a 'dapper Turkish leading man.' There is a whole list of his films here and it says after he left Hollywood he became a still photographer in Vienna. It doesn't say so here, but I think he died recently. Will that do?"

"Jay, you're a wonder. I didn't think about that question after asking it. I appreciate knowing the answer."

"It's okay. Do you remember what Patricia Neal said to Gort?"

"*'Klaatu—barada—nikto.'* How's that?"

"Perfect." □


Ymir (a Harryhausen creation), creature from Venus, in "20 Million Miles to Earth" (USA, 1957).

Dr. Howard Edmund Quinn

**Dr. Howard E. Quinn**, the beloved geology professor and chairman of the Department of Geology, died February 4 in El Paso at age 80. Dr. Quinn was born in Minneapolis on August 24, 1895 and graduated from Melrose, Minn. High School in 1914. He received his E.M. degree in Geology in 1918 and his M.S. in 1926 from the University of Minnesota, his Ph.D. in 1932 from Harvard University. Dr. Quinn, after a year's teaching at the University of Illinois, came to the College of Mines in 1924. As professor of geology and chairman of the department, Dr. Quinn's career with the College of Mines and Texas Western College was one of four decades. He retired in 1965. Mrs. Quinn, the former **Mary Greene Kelly**, served on the Mines-TWC faculty from 1925, as associate professor of sociology, until her retirement in the same year as her husband.

In Francis Fugate's *Frontier College* are the following paragraphs:

"The Quinns, Howard and Mary, came to the faculty early—Howard in 1924 and Mary **Gene Kelly** the following year. Their pictures in the faculty section of the 1926 *Flowsheet* happened to fall side by side, foretelling things to come. In June, 1928, they were married.

"... Many graduates of the College testify volubly to service by Howard and Mary Quinn that reached far above and beyond the call of the classroom, and some who attended during lean financial days will tell you, 'If it hadn't been for the Quinns, I just couldn't have gotten my degree'."

A Memorial Library Fund in Geology in the name of Dr. Quinn has been established; gifts may be sent to the fund in care of the Development Office.

**Dr. C. C. Crawford**, former faculty member and department chairman at UT El Paso, died January 13 in a Phoenix, Arizona hospital. At the time of his death, he was head of the Graduate School at Dallas Christian College. Dr. Crawford joined the Texas Western College faculty in 1953, was chairman of the Department of Philosophy and Psychology until 1962 and continued teaching as a full professor at TWC until 1967. In 1961 he was one of ten professors in the State of Texas to Receive the **Minnie Stevens Piper** award for "Outstanding scholarly and academic achievement."

**Mrs. Winnie K. Wiggins**, wife of Dr. D.M. Wiggins who was president of Texas College of Mines and Metallurgy from 1935-48, died last fall in a hospital in Lubbock, Texas. Dr. and Mrs. Wiggins moved to Lubbock in 1948 when he accepted the post as fifth president of Texas Tech University.

**Mr. Allen Sayles**, former member of the University faculty and staff, died January 18. He came to TCM in 1946 as acting business manager and instructor of economics, later became auditor for the Business Office and assistant professor of math and economics. He retired from Texas Western College in 1959.

**Judge Richard E. Crawford**, who attended UT El Paso more than five decades ago when it was the Texas State School of Mines, died last October. Judge Crawford served six terms as Justice of the Peace, then was named in 1955 to County-Court-at-Law No. 2 where he served until his retirement in January, 1975.

**Mrs. Mary O'Neal Rogers**, Class of 1936 and a life-long resident of El Paso, died December 24 in Laredo, Tex. A retired teacher in the Ysleta Independent School District, she was a member of Grace United Methodist Church, AAUW, and active in the El Paso Chapter of Reach to Recovery.

**Mrs. Melville Clare (Reynolds) Moore**, Class of 1939, died November 16, 1975, and was buried in Ardmore, Oklahoma.

**Mr. Jack Henry Burnett, Sr.**, who attended Texas College of Mines and Metallurgy in the early 1940's, died December 19. He had been a resident of El Paso for 63 years and was a member of Altura Presbyterian Church and El Paso Masonic Lodge 1111.

**Mrs. Eunice D. Hyland**, Class of 1948 with an M.Ed. degree earned in 1955, died November 21, 1975. She was a retired school teacher in The El Paso Independent School District and a member of the Montana Avenue Church of Christ, the Retired Teachers Association, Delta Kappa Gamma and the Lubbock Christian College Association.

**Mr. Cecil S. Bean**, who earned an M.Ed. degree in 1950 from Texas Western College, died January 11. A resident of El Paso for 33 years, he was associated with the El Paso Public Schools for more than 26 years. He was a member of the Masonic Lodge of Grapeland, Tex., and was former principal of Irvin High School.

**Mr. Shibley Azar, Jr.**, who attended Texas College of Mines and Metallurgy in the late 1930's and TWC in the early 1950's, died last October. A lifetime resident of El Paso, Mr. Azar was owner of Shibley Azar Enterprises, a member of the board of directors at First State Bank, and at the YMCA. He was also a member of St. Clements Episcopal Church, El Paso Masonic Lodge 1137, El Paso New York Rite Bodies and El Maida Shrine.

**Mr. Willie A. Strickland**, Class of 1956, died November 10, 1975, in Fabens, Tex. He was a senior Nylic (retired person with 20 years' service) with New York Life Insurance Co., a National Quality Award recipient, and member of El Paso Association of Life Underwriters, Fabens Masonic Lodge 1202, AF&M, El Paso Scottish Rite Bodies, El Maida Shrine Temple and First United Methodist Church of Fabens.





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
