Sir:

Your wife, Mrs. Pola Borenstein, recently called at this office and applied for an immigration visa to enable her to enter the United States. Although Mrs. Borenstein presumably is entitled to enter the United States as a non quota immigrant because of her relation to you, it will be necessary for you to have her status approved by the Department of Labor at Washington, and it is suggested therefore that you complete Form No. 633 in duplicate and forward them to the Commissioner General of Immigration at Washington. D. C.

Mrs. Borenstein informs the Consulate that you already have some of these forms. When the petition has been approved by the Department of Labor it will be returned to this office and your wife's application for a non quota visa will be taken.

The Weichselbaum family is still in Juares awaiting first priority on an agricultural number. Our Consul has again asked for the numbers for this family, as well as for the Wasersuk family.

A first preference quota has been assured to one, Max Phillapovsky, whose American wife lives in Omaha, Nebraska. This number is issued for November, so I have very little hope for the Watsheelbaum family getting in prior to that time. These are all Polish quotas.

We are expecting the return papers on the Pola Gershbein Borenstein case, who will be admitted as a non-quota, due to her husband being an American citizen. These papers are now before the Commissioner General in Washington for his approval.

Dear Mr. Borenstein:-

On August 14th, I wrote your mother as follows:

"I regret to hear that you have not been well, and hope by this time your health has improved.

With reference to Pola, I wish to state that I received your check for \$100.00 on Saturday at noon, and Pola left on the 6:50 P. M. for New York on the same day. The \$100.00 covered her ticket and pullman.

I drew on the Council of Jewish Women for the sum of \$18.50; \$10.00 Visa, \$8.00 Head Tax and 50s taxi service. During our last conversation you stated that you would finance her coming across, and therefore would appreciate your check to the Council of Jewish Women for this amount. Pola left Juares indebted to the Weichselbaum's for the sum of \$40.00. However, she promised to send this amount from Chicago.

Do not think you will have any further difficulties with this case. I have in my possession her marriage certificate and Abe's birth certificate, the only two papers of value which might be of any service to you. If there is any further information desired, I will be glad to serve you further in this case."



My dear Mrs. Zlabovsky:

We understand that you are interested in the above named.

Mrs. Borenstein came to us in great distress, requesting our advice about her problems. Mrs. Borenstein has not heard from her husband directly since she came to New York City. She has had a letter from the young man's mother, requesting that she allow Mr. Borenstein to divorce her. Mrs. Borenstein is fond of her husband and is extremely unhappy over the situation. The would favor a reconciliation and feels that her husband himself might be inclined in this direction also.

However, it seems the young man is greatly influenced by his family and is being compelled to abide by their decision.

We would be interested in knowing first of all what the Borensteins object to in Pola and why they do not favor a reconciliation. We should like you to interview Mr. Borenstein personally away from his family and find out exactly what his attitude is in the matter and what he would wish if his family's objections could be over-ridden.

We feel ourselves handicapped in planning for this woman because we are ignorant of the actual details of the story. Will you try to get us a full report about how the marriage occurred and why Mr. Borenstein has not written to his wife.

Thank you very much for any help you may be able to offer us in this matter.

Dear Miss Mayerson;

Replying to yours of Dec. 10th the above case has caused us a great deal of unpleasantness but we felt after Pela reached New York that the case would be closed. We are glad to give you a resume of this case which is as follows;

Pola came to Juares, Mexico from Mexico City with a letter of

recommendation from the B8 nai Brith to our section. The young man(Abe Borenstein) called on this department asking for our assistance. He wished to marry this young lady. The boy seemed very much in love with the girl and very henorable in his intentions. We want to Juanez to witness the legal marriage of this couple.

They informed us that the marriage would not be consumated until they would go through a Jewish coromony. The young man left immediately for his home in Silver City, New Mexico. The case received a good deal of newspaper publicity because of the romantic aspect.

When Mr. Borenstein's Nother heard of this marriage the was infurated and at the time her objection to the girl was that she was a fereigner and she would less her social prestige if she introduced this girl among her gentile friends.

She put every obstacle in the way of filing the potition for this girl's entry into the U.S. even going so far as to try to bribe the Gouncil into forcing a divorce for her son but since that failed and with further pressure brought to bear we succedded in getting the papers filed and the girl as you know was legally admitted.

Mrs. Rosa Borenstein (the Mother)would not permit Pola to go to Silver City and when we received a wire stating that Polage sister in New York was ill we wired to said Mrs. Borenstein and also to the Young lady's husbind They sent her \$100.00 and their consent that she go immediately to the bed side of her sister.

In the meantime Abe Borenstein disappered from home and when next heard from was in jail in Denver, Colorado. for forgery. The Mother made good the check of some \$300. He was released and his whereabouts are unknown or if known his family refuse to divulge it.

Mrs. Pola Borenstein should consider herself very fortunate that this marriage was mover consumnted because upon fother investigation we find a an insanity streak in this family and this bey is a psychopathic case. We would advadvice that she secure a divorce at the earliest possible moment. It is known to us that Mrs. Rosa Borenstein is a wealthy woman and we feel that she should be forced to pay for all divorce proceedings. Her address is:
