Dear Miss Razovsky:-

Re: Ida Carvel.

This girl's case is similar to our recent Kaplan case. Miss Carvel stopped in El Paso between buses and with a traveling companion went to Juarez, Mexico. On her return she was asked for proof of legal entry in the United States, since she is not an American Citizen, and being unable to furnish the required document she is now being held for verification of legal entry. She is paroled to me and I am waiting on you to help me clear this case. Should you be unable to get the required information, her case will have to be appealed to Washington, and I presume that Washington will pass on the case as they have in similar cases, paroling her for six months, giving her the opportunity to use the seven year status. I would like to save the girl the inconvenience of such a procedure, as it will force her to return to Portland, Maine in order to establish her residence, and in addition to that the cost of \$20.00. Miss Carvel complained to me that she is without funds and I insisted that she write to her mother, but up to date her Mother has sent her no money.

We do not feel that we can possibly finance this girl's stay in El Paso, since her people have the where-with-all to help her. If you can get the name of the steamer, we would again try thru the Immigration Dep't to get the necessary information.

Dear Mr. Carvel; To date we have received no favorable report from New York with reference to establishing your sister, Ida's legal status in the U.S.

The Immigration Department refuses to release her from parole until her legal entry is established. Is there no way that you can help us in this matter? Should we fail to get the necessary report from Ellis Island it will be necessary to make an appeal to Washington and use the seven year legalization measure in her case.

In order to hasten matters I will ask you to get from two prominent citizens who have known your sister during her entire residence in Portland affidavits to that effect. Your early reply will hasten matters in her case. For your future information I wish you to know that your sister has committed no crime or broken any laws, she is just a victim of circumstances having gone to our neighbor foreign country and not knowing the Immigration regulations of the U.S.

Dear Madam:

Your letter of the 22nd. at hand and contents noted. I have taken up the matter with my attorney, who is a particular friend of Senator Wallace H. White. He told him the story how my sister was detained and he promised he would take up this matter himself, at once and straighten it out if possible. The only reason why I did not send the two affidavits was because my lawyer did not think it necessary. These affidavits would have to go to the emigration office and no doubt from there to Washington, and seeing that the Senator is right there, it would save time. I have given you all the information which I could get, I wrote to Ellis Island several times, and they now say that there was a fire and the records were burned.

It certainly is 'nt her fault that the records were burned.

It would seem that anyone who worked in this country as long as my sister, would be able to identify herself, through the different firms for whom she worked.

If you do not get this information direct from Washington, I will send it to you immediately, in case it is sent to me.

I certainly appreciate all you are trying to do to help my sister in the predicament which she has got herself into. I sincerely hope when you next hear from me it will be with information that will help you.

We have so far been able to find no trace of her and advise that you notify her Mother of the seriousness of this and the consequences when she is apprehended by the Government. In this way if the Mother knows her whereabouts as she no doubt will she could notify the girl of her danger and tell her to return to have her case cleared.

Gentlemen:-

Re: Ida Carvel.

Ida Carvel (Chicke Karvelsky) was stopped at the Santa Fe Bridge on Sunday, December 6th, 1931 and questioned as to her citizenship. Upon finding that she was not an American Citizen, she was held for verification of legal entry into the United States.

She was paroled to me on Monday, December 7th, 1931, and from that date to and including February 17th, 1932, she resided at the Eura Hotel, 504 San Francisco Street. During this time I used every possible means to establish her legal entry without success. We were in communication with our New York Office, and they cabled to Liverpool, since it was found that the records under date of this girl's supposed entry into the United States, were destroyed by fire. The Liverpool office has not answered as yet. We also communicated with the brothers, David and Harry Carvel, 54 Middle Street, Portland, Maine, without any favorable results. The girl's story, verified by her mother is as follows:

She came to the United States in the Fall of 1909, accompanied by her Mother, Zelda Karvelsky,
Sister, Edickie, Karvelsky, age 6,
Brother, Ronkie, Karvelsky, age 3
Brother, Rolf, Karvelsky, infant.
They arrived at the Port of New York, and immediately left for Portland, Maine, to join their brothers who are American Citizens. The birthplace of Ida Carvel is Vilna, Gub., Lithuania.

Ida Carvel was travelling from Portland, Maine to Los Angeles, California via the Greyhound Bus Lines. She stopped in El Paso, and went to Juarez to see the sights. The address of her destination in Los Angeles is: % M. Gold, 123 S. Main Street. I am enclosing herewith affidavit and school report for your files.


In response to your inquiry regarding the above named, we wish to report that we interviewed Mr. Max Gould and discussed the matter with him in some detail, explaining to him the importance of the young woman communicating with you immediately.

Mr. Gould tells us that he does not know Miss Carvel's whereabouts. He related that he met the young woman in Portland, Oregon, where her people are supposedly living, and that she corresponded with him quite frequently. Several months ago she wrote to him that she was coming to Los Angeles, and then he again heard from her from El Paso, Texas, from where she wrote that she had been placed under parole to the Council of Jewish Women. She told him that she had been enroute to Los Angeles by way of Texas, and had gone to Juarez, Mexico, to visit. In this letter she had requested that Mr. Gould send her some money, which he did. Since this time however, he has had no word from her, and letters sent to the address given, were returned to him.

After we explained to Mr. Gould, the difficulties the young woman would encounter ^{should} she not clear her record immediately, he agreed to try his utmost to ascertain her present address. He believed that she may have returned to her home in Portland, and has promised to write to friends there and urge her to communicate with you.

Mr. Gould stated that he could give us no further information regarding the young woman, but said that he believed it had been her plan to come to Los Angeles and secure employment. He said that he is at a loss to understand why she left El Paso, and why she did not come to Los Angeles as arranged. We shall keep in touch with Mr. Gould and should we be able to obtain more information, will advise you.

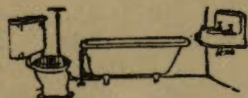

Ida Carol (Chick Karvelsky) was apprehended at Santa Fe Street bridge Sunday December 6, 1931 for verification of legal entry into the United States. She was paroled to me on Monday December 7 from Dec 7, 1931 to Feb 17, 1932 it was known to me that she stayed at the Elerra Hotel San Francisco Street. During ~~her stay~~ the time she was paroled to me I tried to establish her legal entry in the U. S. sending ~~telegram~~ cables to ~~London~~ Southampton the supposed port of embarkation, wrote to the brothers to help get the information we require.
