BEING a foreign born American certainly interferes with sight-to the coast to visit some relatives, she decided to see the sights in Juarez. She found no difficulty in entering Mexico, but the immigration inspectors detained her on the return trip.

She was unable to produce papers to show that she had a right to be in the United States, nor could she name the ship upon which she came to the country in order that her record could be traced.

So she remains in Juarez with her children while her family is keeping the wires hot between here and Philadelphia in an attempt to

Dear Mrs. Rosenfield; Mrs. Lepa accompanied by her three children the eldest a girl of twenty three and a deaf mute coming from Dallas Texas enroute to Los Angeles stopped in El Paso and went to Juarez, Mexico to sight see. On her return she was apprehended at the boubdry and was unable to produce papers to prove her legal right in the United States, and was refused admittance until she could establish and verify that claim. She is of an unusually illeterate type and the only information she could give us was that she entered at the port of Philadepphia some thirty years ago and shortly before a President was assassinated.

She also, stated that it was sometime after Shevouth so from the above information we made our deductions and sent you the telegram.

The wire from Mrs. Eva Schevell in answer to mine of March 21st. enabled us to get this woman admitted into the United States however only on parole until the authorities get legal documents from the port at which she entered.

This family was apprehended at the El Paso port of entry for verification of legal entry into the United States. She has been paroled to the El Paso Council of Jewish Women until the case is legally cleared at Immigration headquarters. She was permitted to continue her journey to Los Angeles her destination from Dallas, Texas.

The eldest child a girl of twenty three is a deaf mute.

Mrs. Lepa for reasons best known to herself refused to give me an authentic address of friends in Los Angeles. This is the only information we were able to get. Isidore Kahn working at the United Wholesale Grocery is a friend.

We ask you to please get in touch with this case and keep her under supervision until the Immigration headquarters clears the files.

For your further information she travelled from Dallas to El Paso with a Mr. and Mrs. C. Lefkovitz who are now located at 2509 Westview, Los Angeles.

Roplying to your letter of the 14th inst., with reference to the above mentioned family, wish to, state that they were detained here in El Paso for three weeks for verification of her legal entry in the United States. After considerable difficulty, we found out thru the untiring efforts of our Philadelphia office, that she was legally admitted under the name of Amelia Greenfeld, Innigration Station Gloucester, on July 10th, 1900.

The immigration department in El Paso had not received official notice of legal entry at the time of their departure from El Paso. However, the case is now cleared, and we appreciate your co-operation.
