You know of course that we have had correspondence on the case of Richard Sandberg of Breslau. I was very much surprised this morning to see them come in and I am free to admit that I am deeply saddened. He is a tall, slender, grey haired man and I believe very fine but he was simply broken under what he has had to go through, cannot even tell his story but wept bitterly. He came on a visitor's visa and cannot return. It is absolutely essential that we procure affidavits as soon as possible and apply for change of status.

Will you please see Mrs. J. Calisher, 1431 Hawthorne Place, El Paso and help her draw up the papers. Mr. Sandberg tells me that he will write to her direct.

Upon receipt of your letter of Sept 16, 1938 I contacted the Calisher family. Mrs. Calisher is reluctant about signing an aff. for some one she doesn't know but she has always assisted suffering humanity and feels that she will help where & where necessary. You failed to state for what length of time his visa permits him to stay in the United States & the status of his German passport you also failed to state whether this man came alone or with his family.

Here is my advice in this case. Since he must leave the United States to change his status have him come to El Paso - see that he has all necessary documents & have his passport extended by the German Consul in New York prior to his departure, if possible for 4 months. When he arrives here I will get the necessary affidavit from either Mrs. Calisher or a friend and will present his case to the American

Consul in Juarez Mexico checking him out
of the United States until the number is ^{available}
available for his re-entry. If I find that the man
is not deserving I can have his visitor's visa
extended & he can re-enter the United States ^{with}
such a time that he will find another country
that he may enter; but if, on the other hand if
is deserving we will give him all the aid ^{it is}
possible for our small community to extend. -

Mr. Sandberg has just been in our office bringing with him affidavits of support made out by Mrs. Calischer. In the first place they are made on the wrong kind of affidavit. Secondly they do not give information to make it possible for the Consul to act. I would send you these affidavits and ask you to see Mrs. Calischer but it might be embarrassing for her to have to discuss her private affairs with a friend and towns person. Therefore I have decided it is best to write to her personally. I will send you a carbon of this letter but I wish you would not mention it to Mrs. Calischer.

Dear Mrs. Calishber:

Mr. Richard Sanberg has just been in the office bringing to us the affidavit of support that you have made out in his behalf. It is indeed kind of you to have done this and he appreciates it greatly. He seems to be a very nice sort of man and I feel very sorry for him as he appears to be suffering greatly, under the burden he has to carry.

The affidavits that you made are on a wrong form. The form that you used was for a friend, not for a relative. If Mr. Sandberg is the son of your deceased husband's sister it is considered a blood tie by our Consul and we should so state for naturally we have to do everything we can to strengthen affidavits. I am redoing these papers but of course there is not much that I can insert as I do not know. You state that you have an annual income of \$2000 but do not tell from where it is derived. Is it by chance income from investments or are you in business? In either event won't you give some proof. If it is from income and your business is being managed by the bank or broker, will you get a statement from them please.

As to your property, the last tax receipt will do. I am awfully sorry to have to trouble you but I am sure you are as concerned about conditions as are the rest of us and want to do whatever you can.
