Enclosed please find passport of Pauline Muller/which I would like extended to and including 1932.

I want to call your attention to this passport. You will notice the girl was given a transient visa from Havana Cuba to Montreal Canada. Her case is as follows;

Upon reaching New Orleans she married an American Citizen whom she had met while in Havana. Her husband is the son of a Methodist Minister. She never left the States because shortly after her marriage she found that her husband had tuberculosis and she has devoted the past four years caring for him.

She is now in El Paso and wants to legalize her entry into the country. Of course, it is imperative that she depart from this country so that her husband may file #633 form and she may enter as a non- quota.

What is your opinion with reference to, this case and should we assist such cases? These people are destitute due to the constant drain from the country. You realize I know that we must use every bit of our influence to have this woman legally admitted into Mexico, before we can file the husband's petition.

1. When and where married, certificate if possible.
2. Her own birth certificate, if she has one, or a homestead certificate, or a statement made before a Notary Public, as to when and where she was born.
3. Husband's birth certificate or statement made before a Notary Public stating when and where he was born.

Trusting you will be able to secure this information as soon as possible, and forward same to me, at which time, I will again try to secure the necessary passport.

Dear Mr. Hirschfield:

I have today filed form No. 633 on the case of Pauline Muller Martyn. She is the wife of an American citizen, and her husband filed this petition. I want to give you a history of the case and ask that you follow it up, and intercede in her behalf, should any question be brought up.

Pauline Muller entered the United States at the port of New York on a Transient Visa from Havana, Cuba, to Canada. However, she never departed from the United States, but proceeded to New Orleans where she married Mr. Martyn, whom she met while living in Havana. Shortly after her marriage, her husband became ill, and she could not leave him. He has recently recovered and he is now living in El Paso, Texas. She left the United States, voluntarily, entering Mexico for the purpose of legally entering this country. Mr. Martyn is in the employ of the Wilson Company, packers, and has held this position for the past 12 years. During the four years of their marriage, Mr. Martyn was transferred to various sections of the country, and they never established a domicile up to the time that he was transferred to El Paso, Texas, from Phoenix, Arizona.

Dear Mrs. Zlabovsky:

Your letter of the 4th instant in re Pauline Muller Martyn at hand. We assume that Mrs. Martyn is now outside of the United States as otherwise the Department will not approve her husband's petition in her behalf. If she is outside of the United States and if the petition is in correct form, etc., it will be approved in due course in about ten days or two weeks and the Department of State will thereupon notify the Consul in the district where she is residing that she is entitled to a non-quota status. She will then be requested by the Consul to call at the Consulate and make formal application for her visa. She must be prepared to submit her birth certificate, marriage certificate, medical certificate, certificate of good conduct, etc. If everything is in order and the Consul is also satisfied that her husband is able to maintain her and that there is no likelihood of her becoming a public charge, he will then give her a visa upon which she can then apply for permanent admission to the United States. The Consul's action may be delayed when he learns that she has been in the United States as he will then probably make official inquiry to ascertain whether a deportation order was ever made against her and thus barring her from reentering the United States.

Accordingly, there is nothing that we can do in this matter at present as it will take its regular course as above outlined. If, however, any complication should arise or any service required that can be rendered here, please write us again and we shall be very glad to give our careful attention to any such troublesome angle that may arise hereafter.

In reply to your letter of December 9, 1931, I regret to note that several items were not submitted properly in my petition for non-quota visa for Pauline Muller Martyn, my wife, and I beg to return herewith petition in duplicate together with my affidavit, setting forth the facts concerning my birth certificate, my departure from and return to the United States, also the facts covering enlistment or service in a foreign army, all of which I trust you will find in proper form.

With reference to the date of departure and the residence at this time or since the petition was made of my wife, I beg to advise that since December 1, 1931, Pauline Muller Martyn, my wife, has resided at 124 16th of September St. in the city of Juarez, State of Chihuahua, Mexico, and that she departed from the port of El Paso by way of the Stanton St., bridge in the city of El Paso, Texas, into Mexico.

The location of the American Consul where application will be made for the immigration visa, is at Ciudad Juarez, State of Chihuahua, Mexico.



PACKERS AND PROVISIONERS

I knew my husband in Havana, Cuba before we were married and we intended to get married there but the company for whom he worked transferred him suddenly to the United States and according to Cuban law the application for a marriage license has to be made several weeks in advance and the announcement published in the newspapers. My husband had to leave at once and could not wait to do this.

A few months later I got a non-quota visa to Canada for six months ~~xxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxxx~~, so the American Consul in Havana gave me a transit visa to enter the United States. My intention really was to go to Canada and then try to get from there some contract for work so I could come into this country. Before I left the boat in New York I paid my head tax and got a certificate for it permitting me to stay one day in New York. After I saw that the immigration officials made no effort to watch me I took the risk of staying there. I entered this country in March 1927 and my husband and I were married in July 1927.XN

After we were married I intended to go back to Cuba and apply for a non-quota visa to enter this country as the wife of a native born American. Soon after this my husband's health began to fail and so I was not financially able to go back to Cuba

and after we were married a little more than a year my husband broke down with tuberculosis then of course it was out of the question for me to leave him as he was sick in bed and unable to work for more than two years. I really did not care if I put myself in danger of being deported and I took the risk of taking him to Arizona and there I earned a living and took care of him at the same time. Although I am a milliner by profession I could get work of this kind and be near home so I could take care of my husband so I did all kinds of housework which was real hard on me but I succeeded in getting my husband well and he is now back at work. I can furnish excellent references as to my character from people who knew me in Arizona and I think there would be no doubt that I would make a good citizen.

My present status worries me so much that I want to go to a foreign country and apply for permission to re-enter as a non-quota immigrant as the wife of an American citizen but I am afraid the authorities in Washington would refuse the permission because I did wrong. I admit I did wrong by staying but I just couldn't do any different because I wanted to stick to my husband to get him well and it would nearly kill me if I have to give him up now forever.

We can also furnish good references about my husband's character and that he is able to support me.
