Subjects

(TAPE I, SIDE I)

- 1 -- 3 Introduction; early history of Sierra Blanca and Hudspeth County around 1915; the Tio Ranch in Chihuahua and incidents during the Mexican Revolution that involved it; General Terrazas, Governor of Chihuahua.
- 3 -- 6 Foot Boykin murder about 1915 and subsequent incidents in southwest Texas relating to the murder.
- 6 -- 8 Army post in Sierra Blanca; George S. Patton assigned there.
- 8 -- 11 Frank Nash -- outlaw, trainrobber, and bankrobber; the Kansas City Massacre.
- 11 -- 12 Harry More, first Sheriff of Hudspeth County; separation of Hudspeth County from El Paso County in 1917; Tom Love, county organizer.
- 12 -- 16 Incidents at the Love Ranch around 1915; beginning of the story of the death of Pascual Orozco (killed by Dave Allison in a shootout in Culberson County).
