Biographical Sketch

Arturo Islas Jr. was a Chicano professor and writer. He was born to Arturo Islas Sr. and Jovita La Farga in El Paso, Texas on May 24, 1938. Islas credited his love of learning and reading to his grandmother, Crecenciana Sandoval Islas who instilled in him and his cousins the importance of education and being bilingual. At age 8, he contracted polio which left him with a limp. Islas experienced other serious health problems throughout his life. He was valedictorian of El Paso High in 1956 and earned a scholarship to attend Stanford University. At Stanford, he got his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. in English. In 1971, he became a tenure-track professor at Stanford. A popular professor, he received the Dinkelspiel Award for Outstanding Service to Undergraduate Education from Stanford in 1976.

In 1976, he began working on a book called *Día de los Muertos*, which would later become *The Rain God*. The book was rejected several times during the 1980s. In 1984, *The Rain God* was published by a small local publishing press. He went back home to El Paso to be a visiting professor at the University of Texas at El Paso during 1986-1987 semesters. During this time, he began working on *La Mollie and the King of Tears*. Islas got a contract with William Morrow to publish the sequel to *The Rain God*, named *Migrant Souls*.

Islas wrote about the Chicano, gender, and queer experience on the border. He wanted to show that Chicano literature was as valid and important as mainstream literature. Islas was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the Rocky Mountain Modern Language Association. In 1986 he received a Southwest Book Award from the Border Regional Library Association for *The Rain God*.

He died on February 15, 1991 of complications from AIDS.

Series Description

The Arturo Islas collection is arranged in three series:

Series I: Biographical Information/Publications

Arranged by format and then chronologically. The series includes a yearbook, literary journals, magazines, books, flyers, articles, clippings, reviews, a letter and a postcard.

Series II: Photographs

Arranged chronologically, the series includes 3.5 x 5 prints, negatives and a contact print.

Series III: Oversized Materials

Arranged chronologically, the series includes clippings, copies of articles, and a poster.

Scope and Content Notes

The Arturo Islas collection spans the years 1954-2000. The bulk of the collection is from 1990-1991. Types of records found within the collection are books, newspaper clippings, photocopies of clippings, literary journals, a yearbook, programs, flyers, magazines, reviews, interviews and photos. The collection includes items written by and about Islas. The materials cover various issues relating to the border including bilingualism, biculturalism, family, affirmative action, and the literary merit of Chicano literature.

The collection is arranged into three series: Biographical Information, Photographs, and Oversized materials. The **Biographical information/Publications** series contains articles, poems, short stories, flyers, programs, reviews, interviews, literary journals, a yearbook and books written by or about Islas. The biographical information series was primarily arranged by format. The books, journals, yearbooks and magazines were grouped together and arranged chronologically in boxes 1 and 2. The flyers, programs, school notebook, articles, clippings and reviews were also grouped and arranged chronologically in box 3. The articles and clippings document various stages of Islas' life and reviews of his creative works. Some folders contain all the reviews in the collection concerning *The Rain God* and *Migrant Souls*. The clippings also document his time as a visiting professor to UTEP as well as his induction to the Herald Post's Writers Hall of Fame.

The **Photographs** series includes pictures of Islas and his parents at the 1990 Galarza lecture, pictures of an Ofrenda for Islas at Gilroy Library in Santa Clara County and other photographs of Islas. The **Oversized materials** series contains newspaper clippings and a poster.

Provenance Statement

This collection was donated by Jovita La Farga, Arturo's mother on April 8, 2003. Many of the items in the collection are inscribed by Islas to his parents and siblings. More items were added to the collection on October 10, 2003.
