Historical Sketch

The Festival Theatre was a non-profit community theater in El Paso that opened in 1965. El Pasoans William Kastrin and his daughters, Veronica Kastrin and Linda Abraham, along with Ken Letner of San Francisco, first conceived the idea of the Festival Theatre. The purpose of the theater was to produce plays for the community by the community. The theater was located at 2501 Montana Avenue (now home of the El Paso Playhouse). The building was purchased with funds donated by William Kastrin, and the building underwent remodeling in February 1965. On April 8, 1965 the theater's first production, *Under the Yum Yum Tree*, opened under the direction of Ken Letner. Letner served as artistic director of the Festival Theatre for its first five years. The Festival Theatre was often supported by donations from people attending its productions. A board of directors made financial and administrative decisions. The theater was also supported by a Women's Guild which was involved in the theater's management, fundraising, and operations. In 1972 the Festival Theatre Guild produced a Spanish-language version of West Side Story. According to the August 4, 1972 issue of the *El Paso Herald-Post*, this was "the first time a bilingual production has been staged in our border city." Some of the plays and musicals that were put on by the Festival Theatre included *The Little* Foxes, Henry IV, West Side Story, The Importance of Being Earnest, Fiddler on the Roof, and Camelot. During the late 1960s and early 1970s the Festival Theatre also ran an acting school. Due to financial problems, the Festival Theatre later combined with another local theater group, the Upstairs Theatre, to form the El Paso Playhouse.
