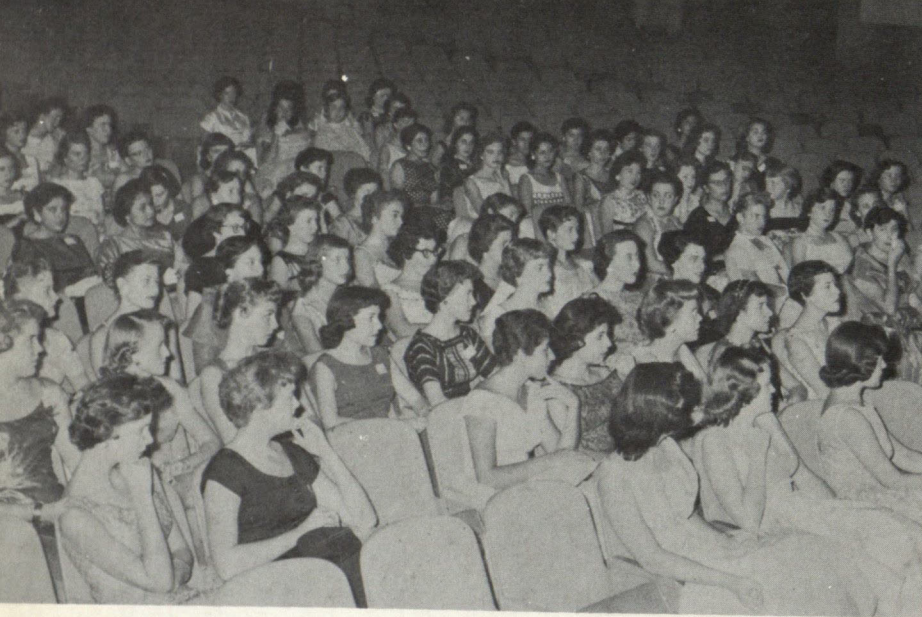

Psi Thetas, dressed as little girls, seemed to have a good time.

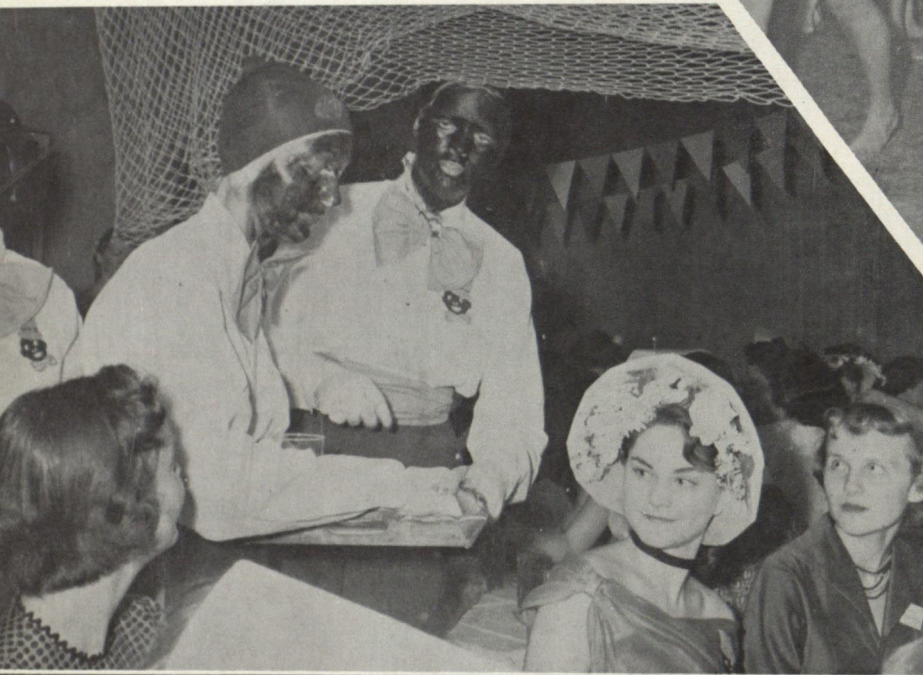

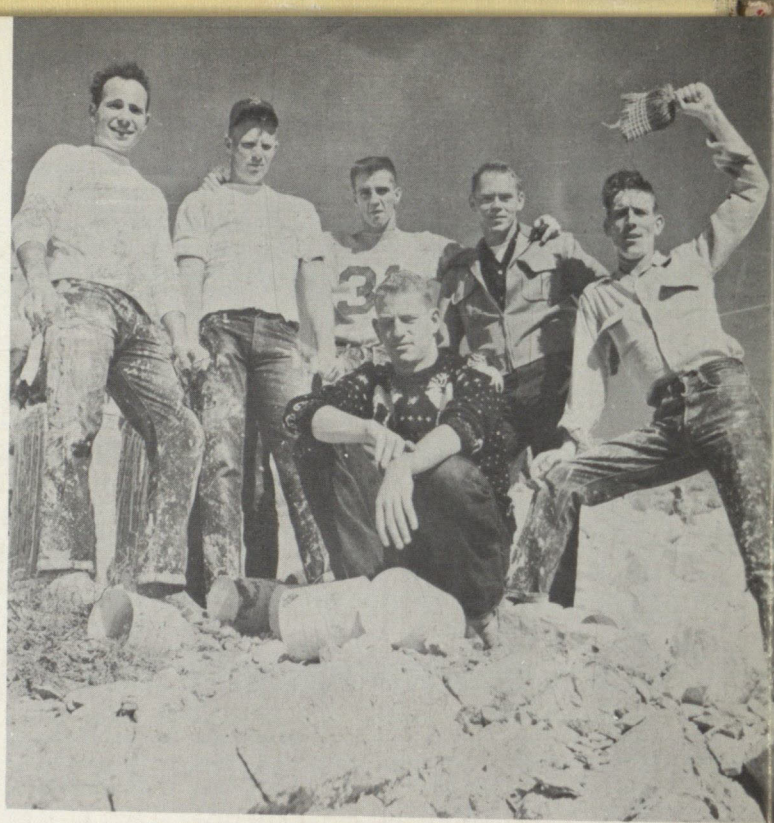

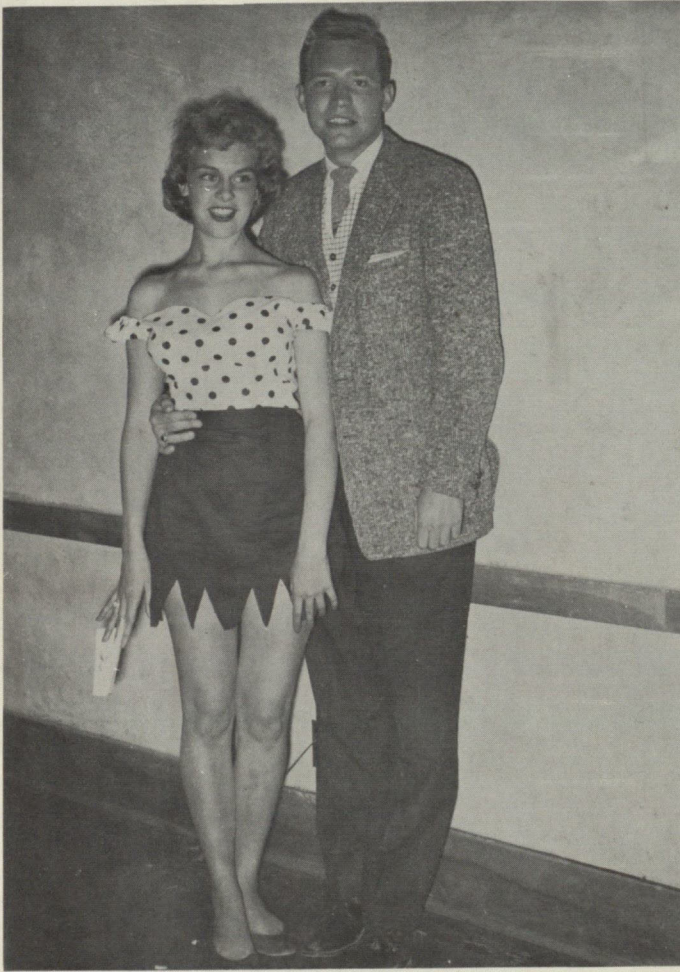


"M" DAY

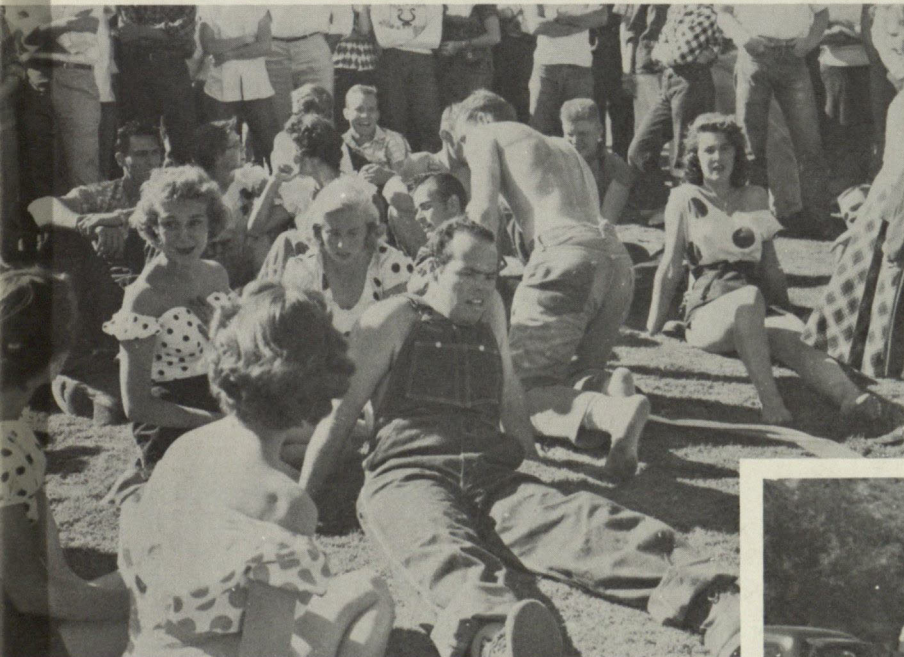

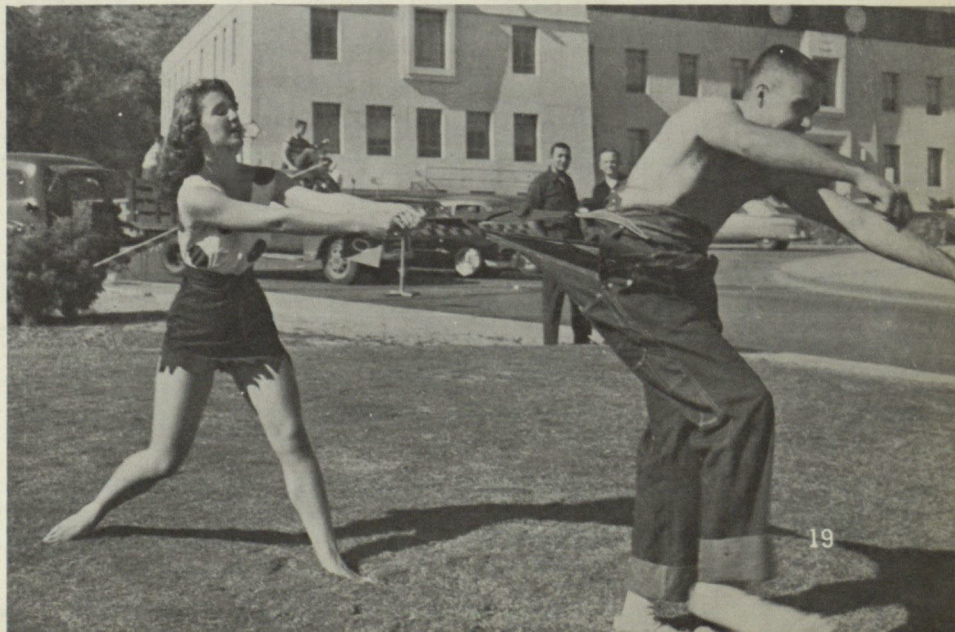

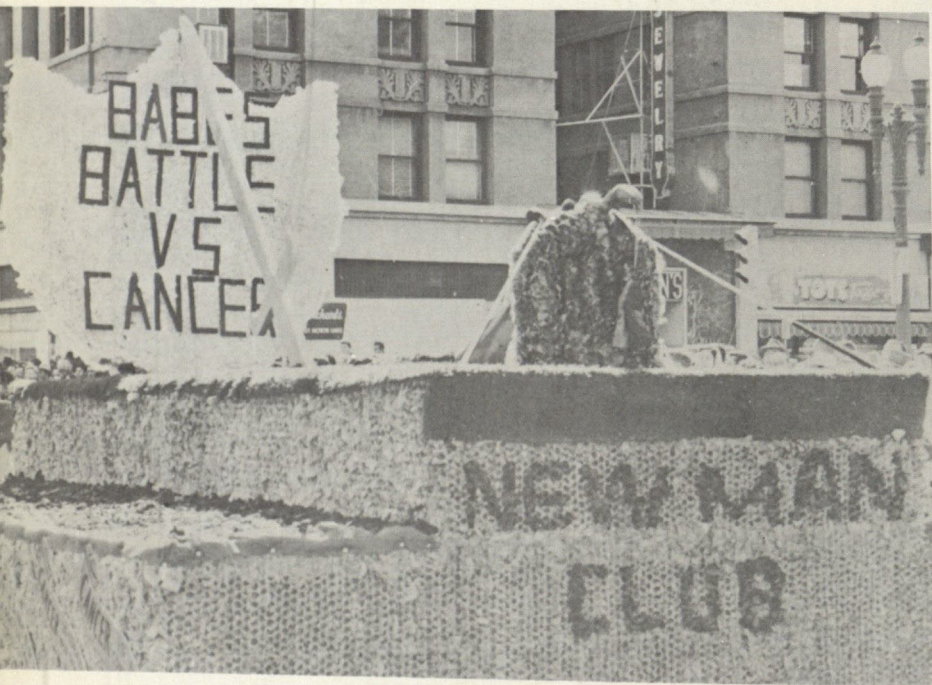

Dr. L. A. Nelson was honored during Homecoming activities as the Outstanding Ex-Student.

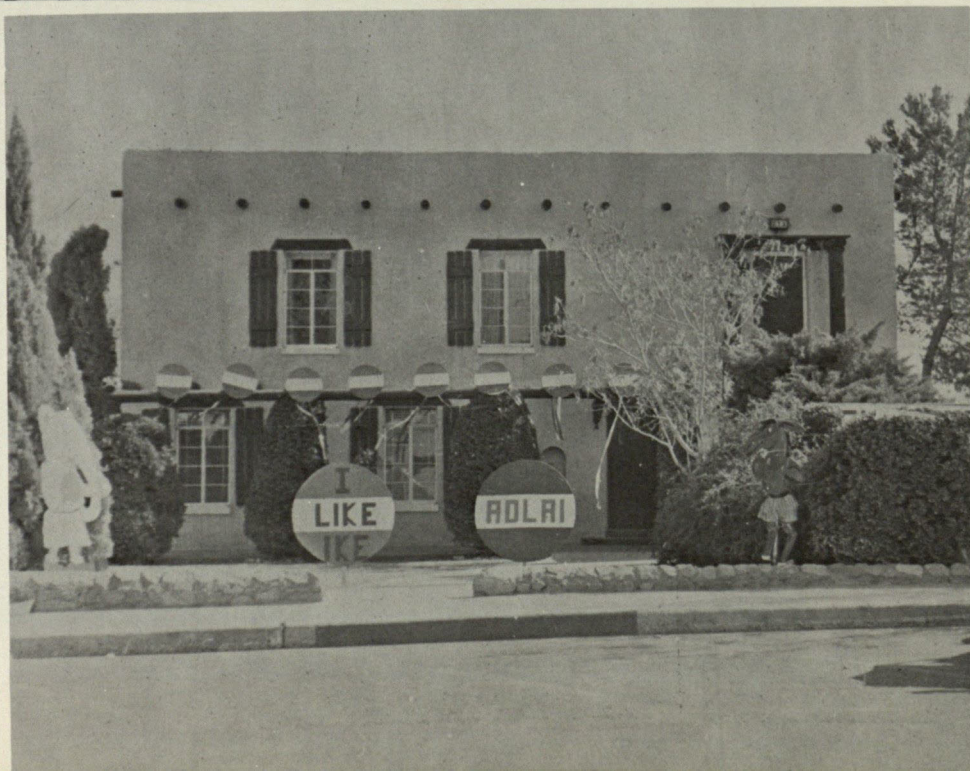


A miniature football game decorated the outside of the Delta Gamma lodge during Homecoming events.

House decorations were first used this year by the sororities after a decision by Panhellenic Council. Tri-Delta carried out the battle theme with the "Battle against Tooth Decay."



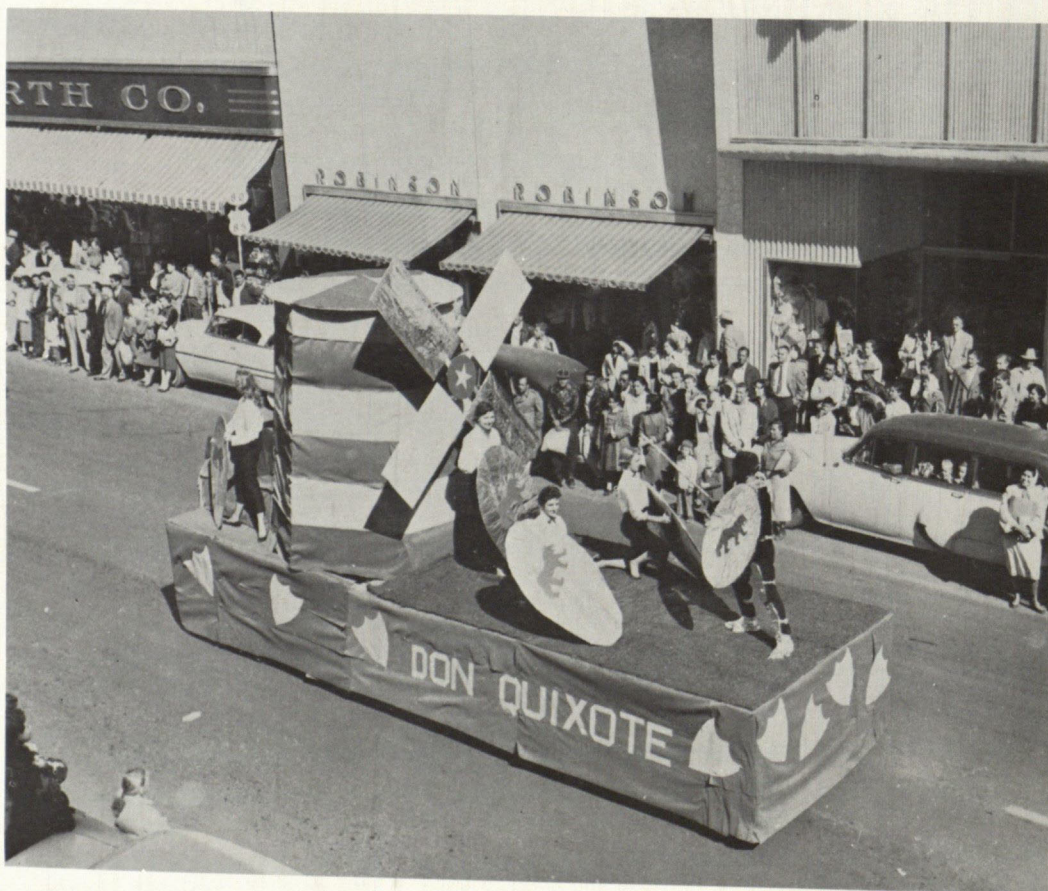
Zeta Tau Alpha used the political battles as their house decoration theme.



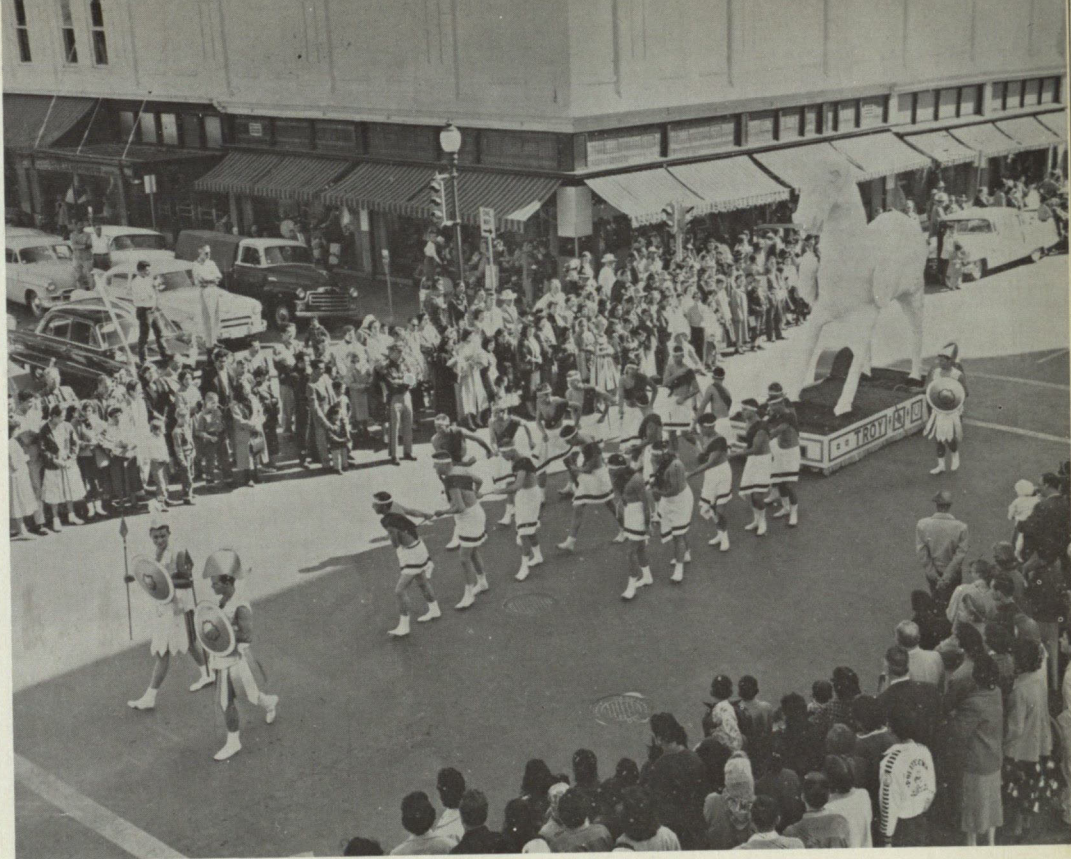
Phi Kappa Tau Fraternity copied the Sweepstakes trophy with their float depicting the "Battle of Iwo Jima."

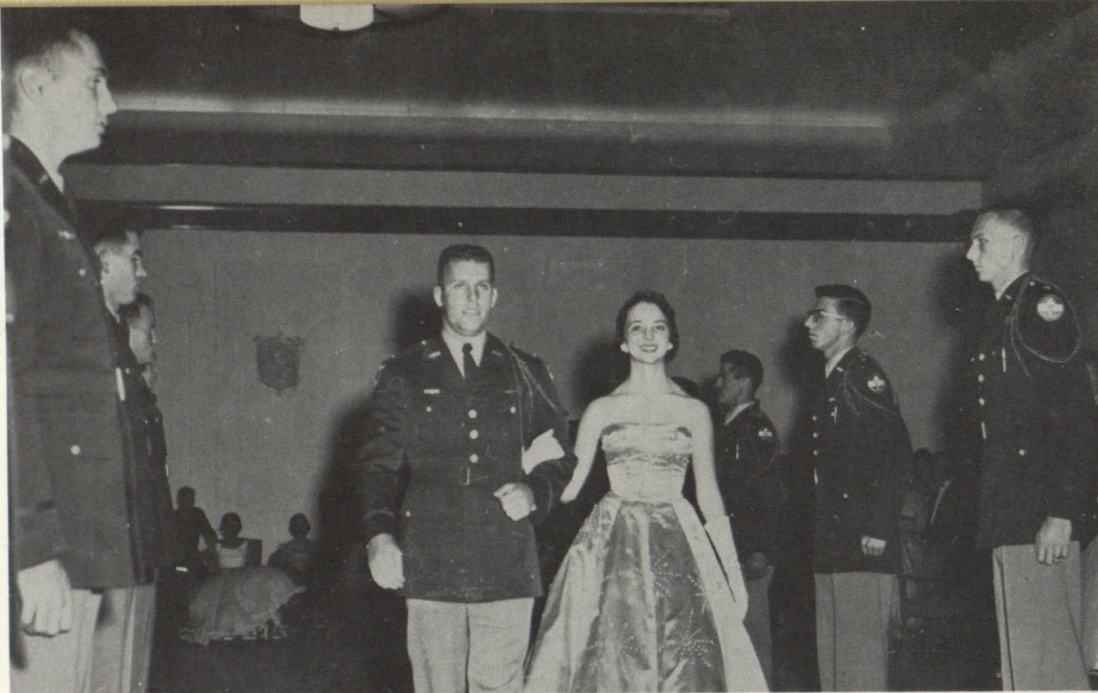

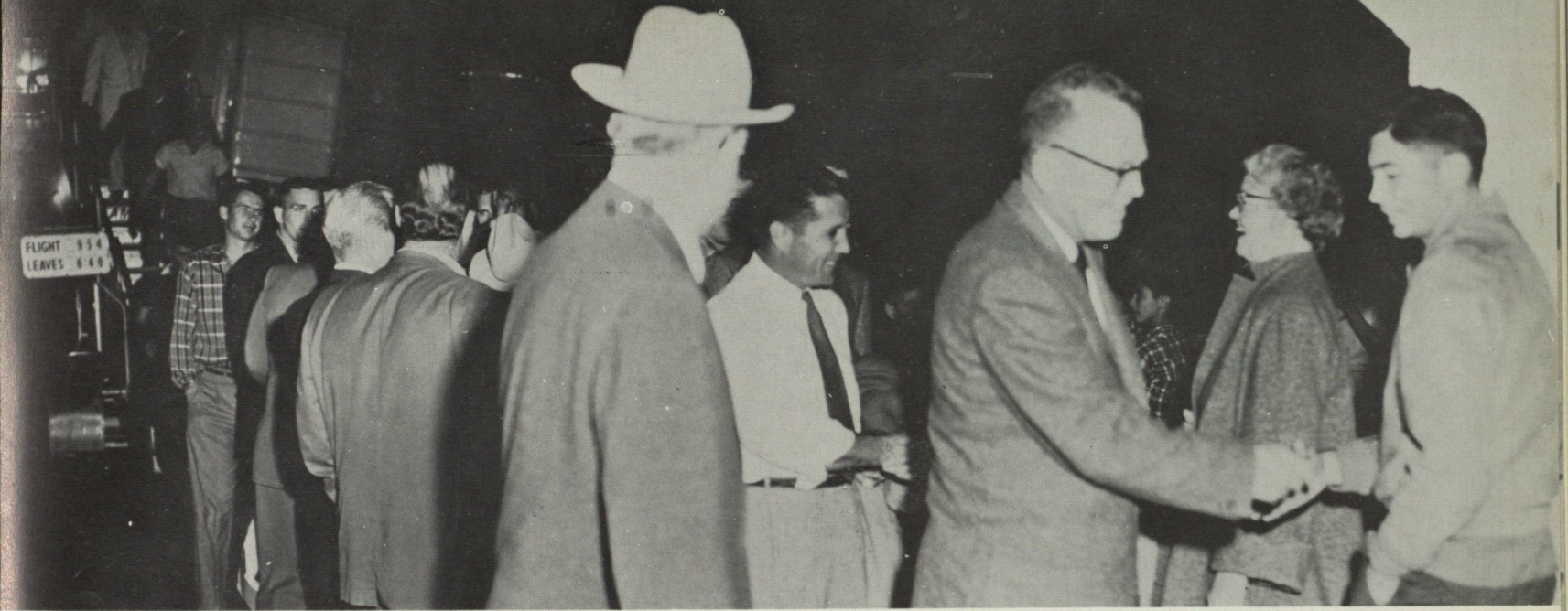

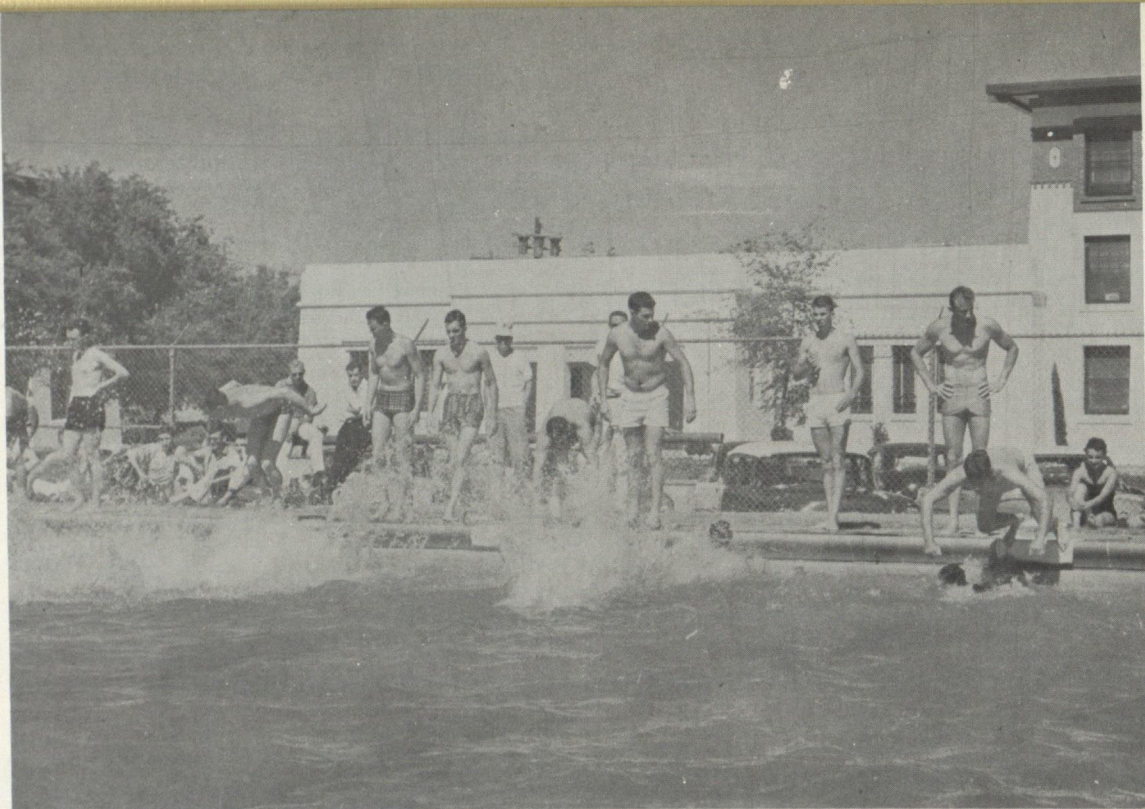

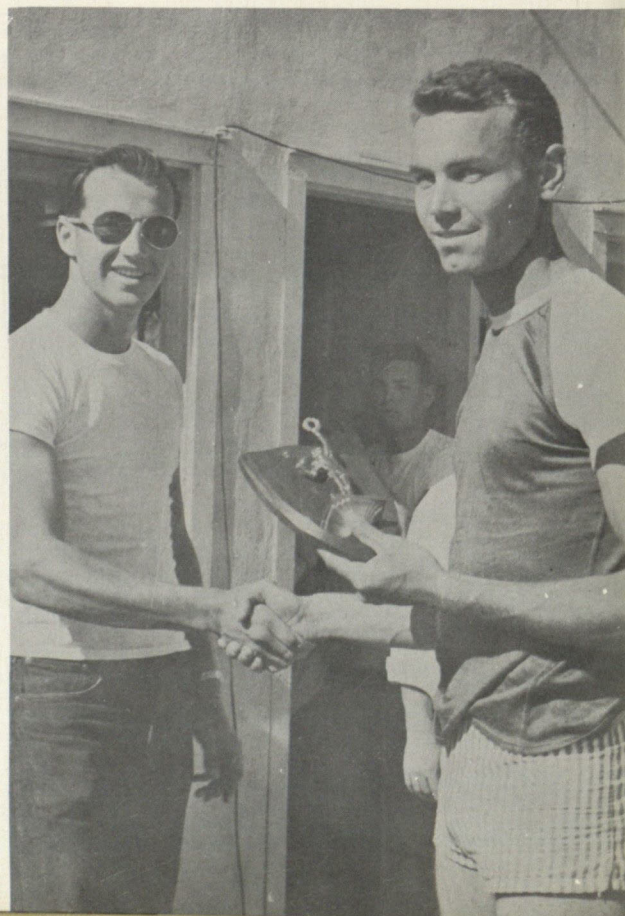

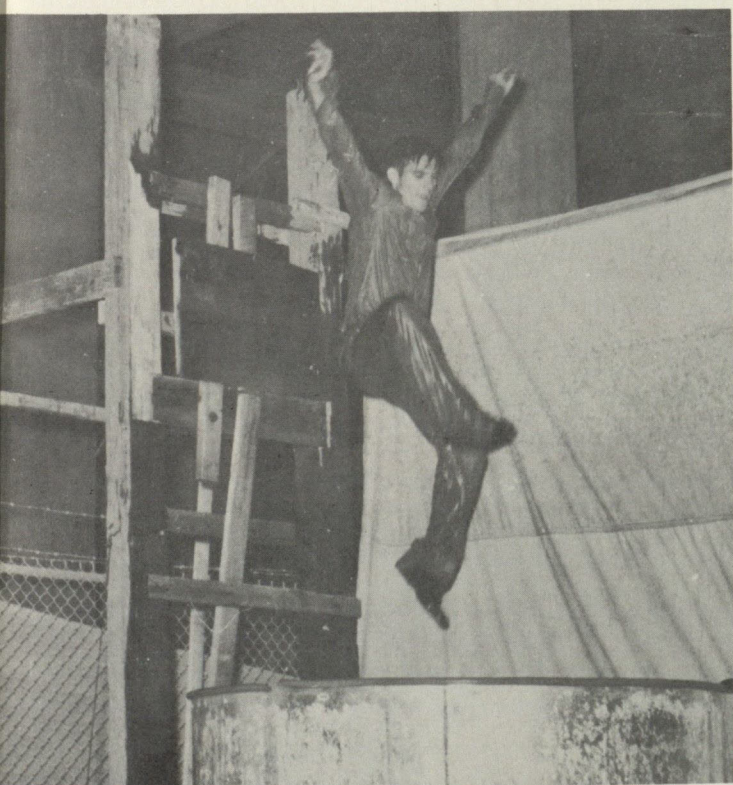

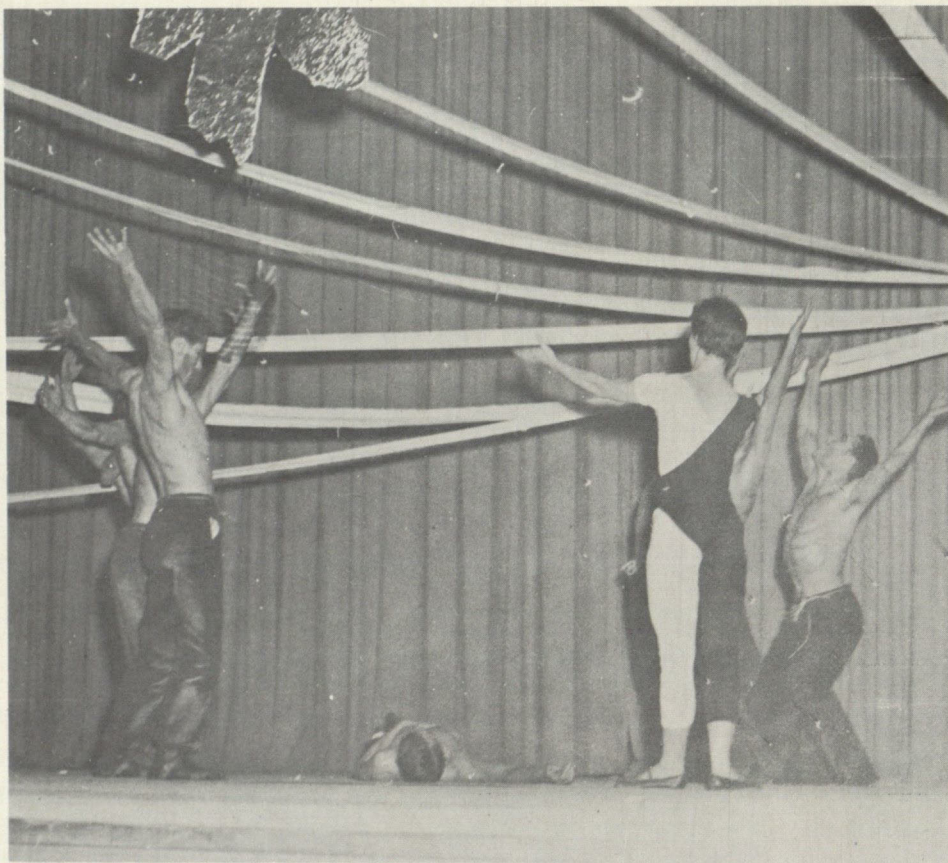

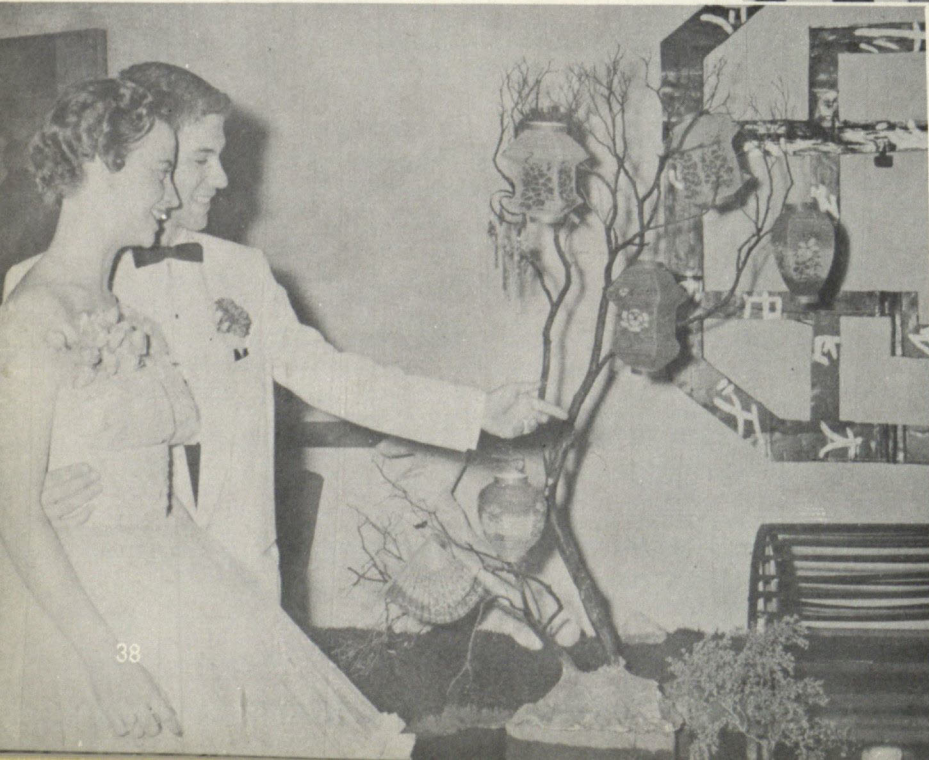

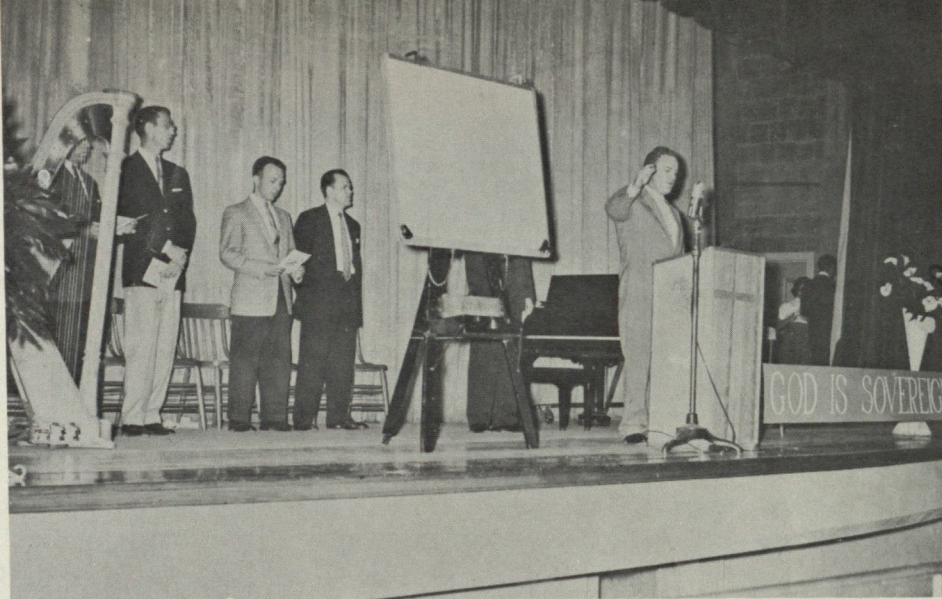
RELIGION IN LIFE

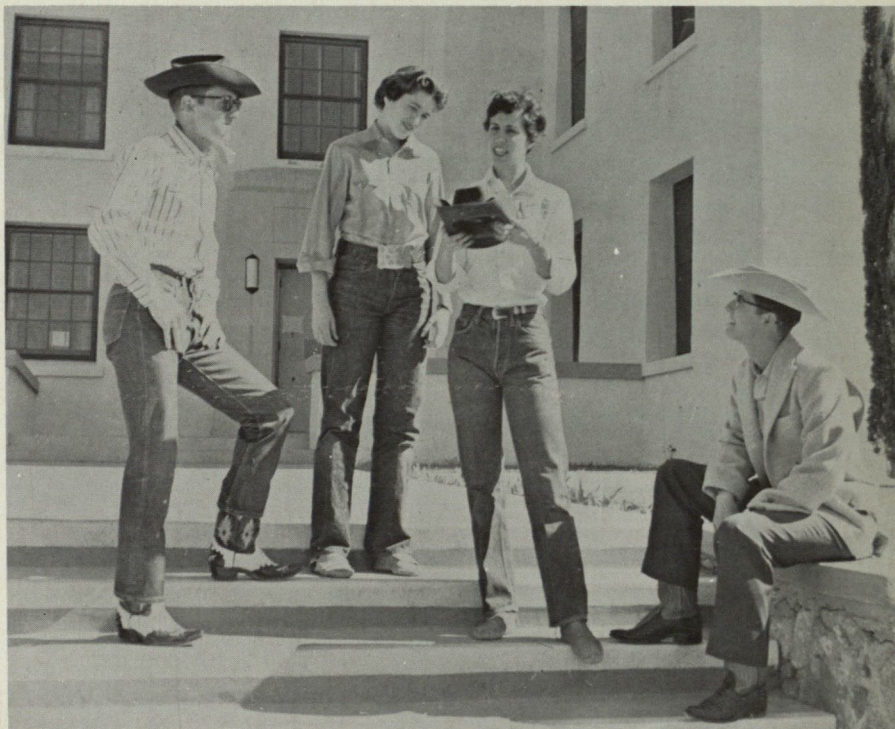

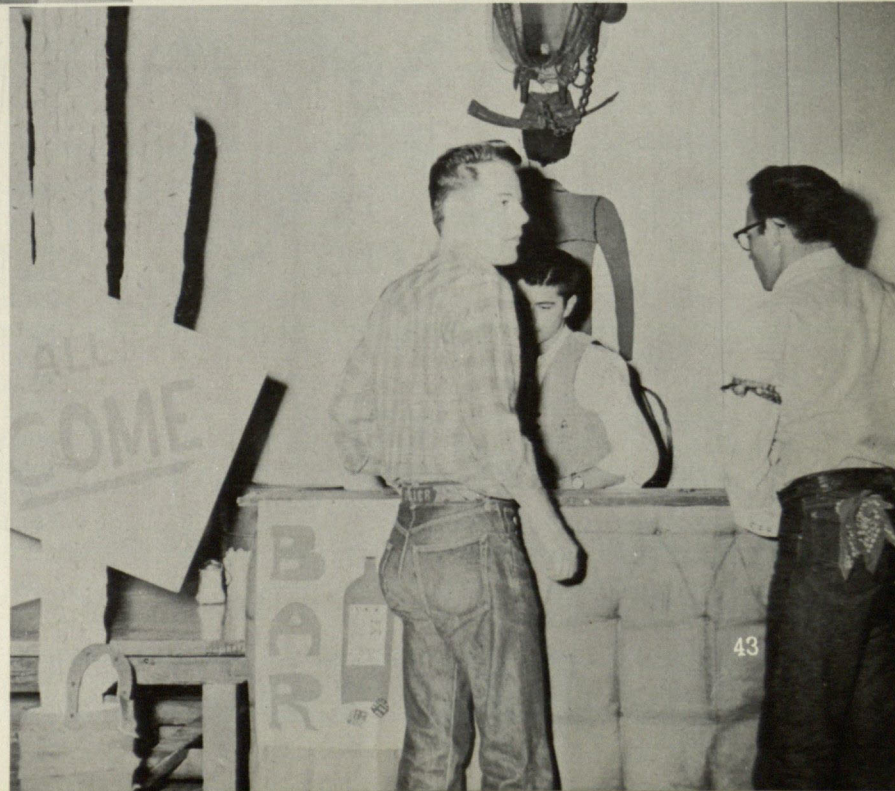

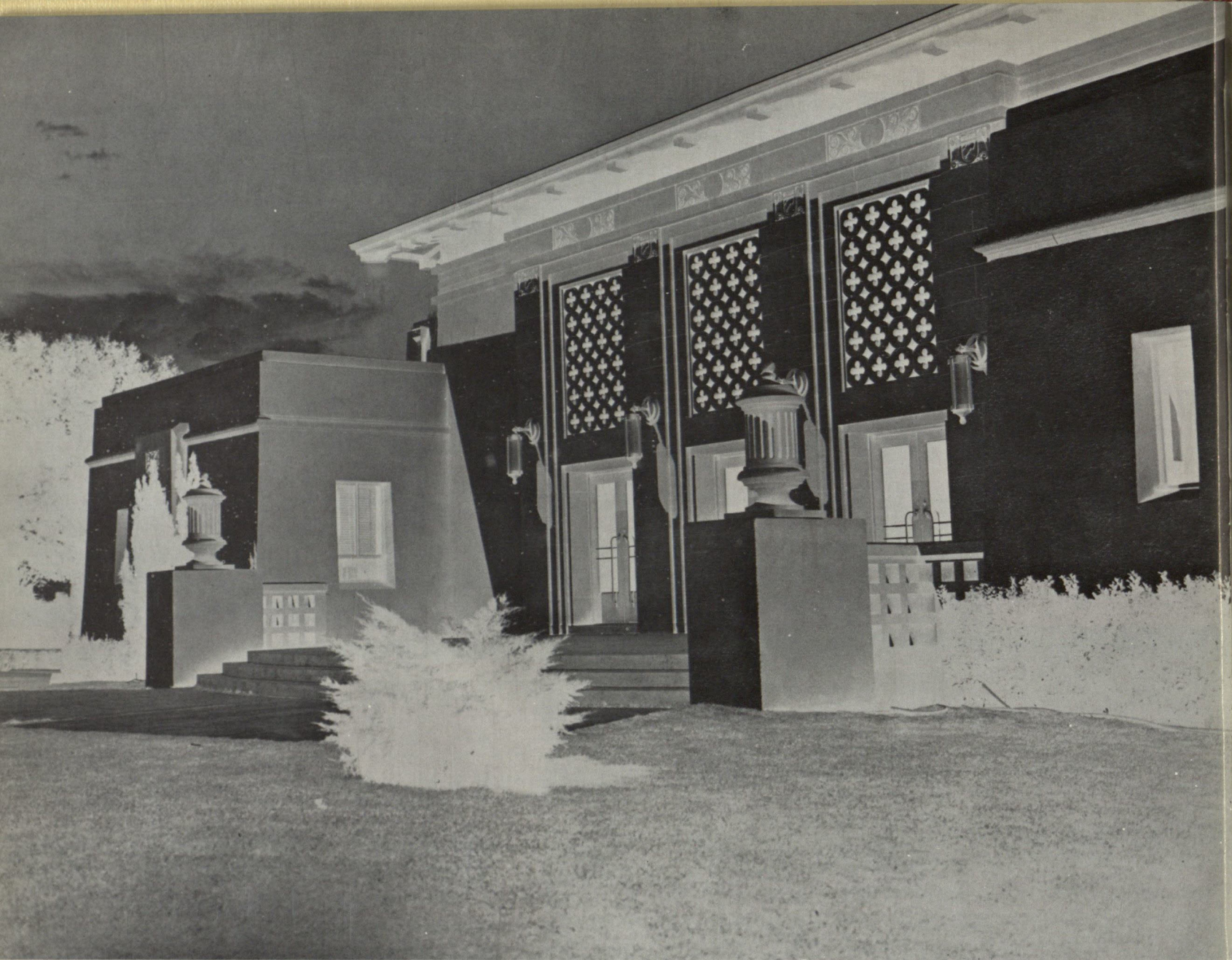

STUDENT UNION BUILDING — Better known as the S.U.B., the Student Union Building is the center of social life on the campus. Here is located a co-op store, a snack bar, the Student Association office, the publication offices, men's, women's, and faculty lounges, and a ballroom with a stage. This building was built at a cost of \$200,000. The students, through the Student Association, bonded themselves to pay \$50,000 of the amount, while the College paid the remaining \$150,000 out of local funds and gifts.
