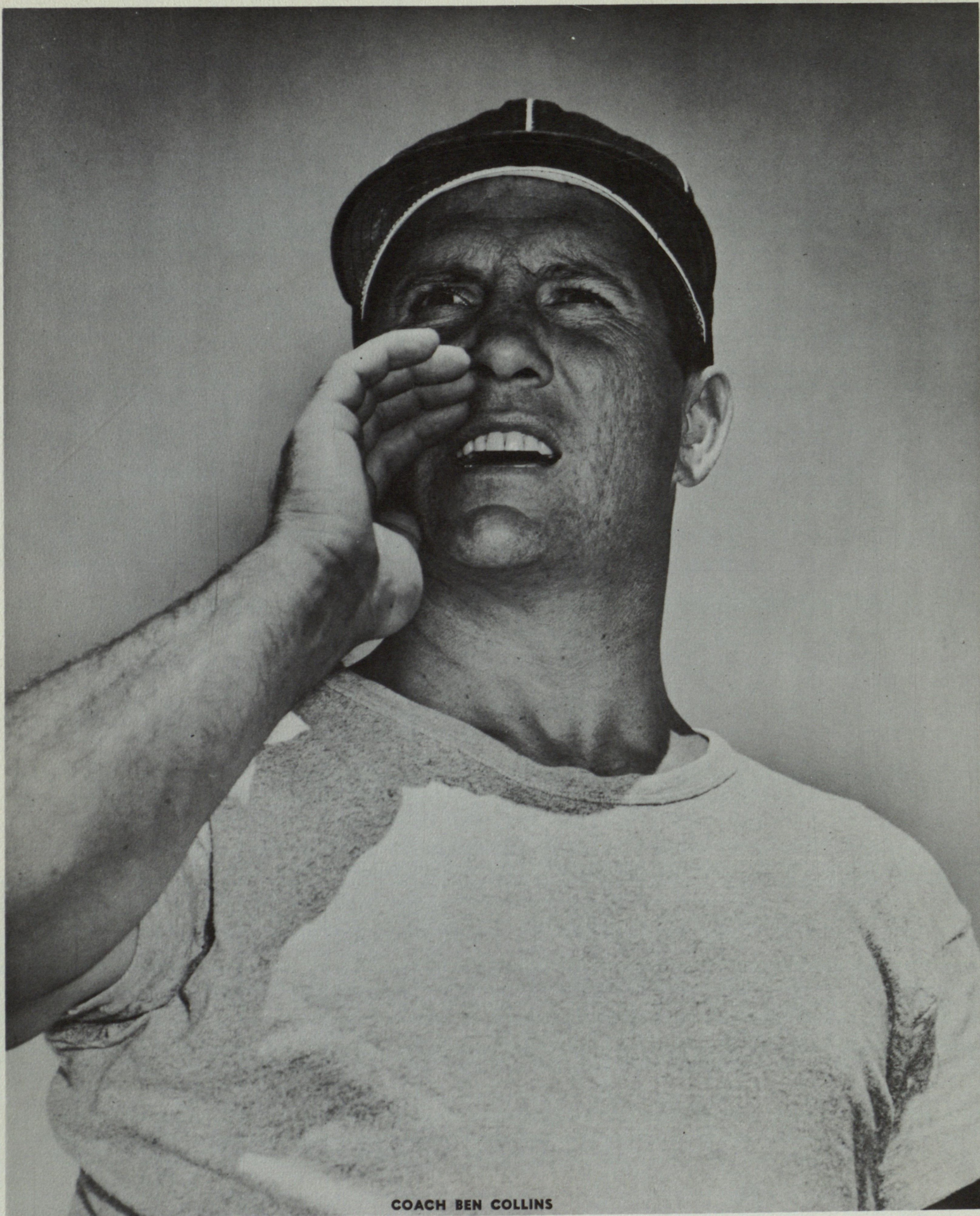

Ben Collins, backfield coach at Texas Western College since 1946, succeeded Mike Brumbelow as Head Coach of the Miners in mid-summer of 1957.

Coach Collins holds a Master of Science degree from the University of Utah. At Texas Western, he is an assistant professor of Health & Physical Education.

While in his final year of varsity competition he was named Little All-American. That season he scored 132 points, second high in the nation, and gained 1,151 yards rushing.

Coach has produced some of the Border Conference's finest backs at Texas Western, and has proved himself a master at developing quarterbacks. The last three men to hold that position under his coaching have been named to the All-Conference team. They include Bob Laraba, Dick Shinaut, and Jesse Whittenton.

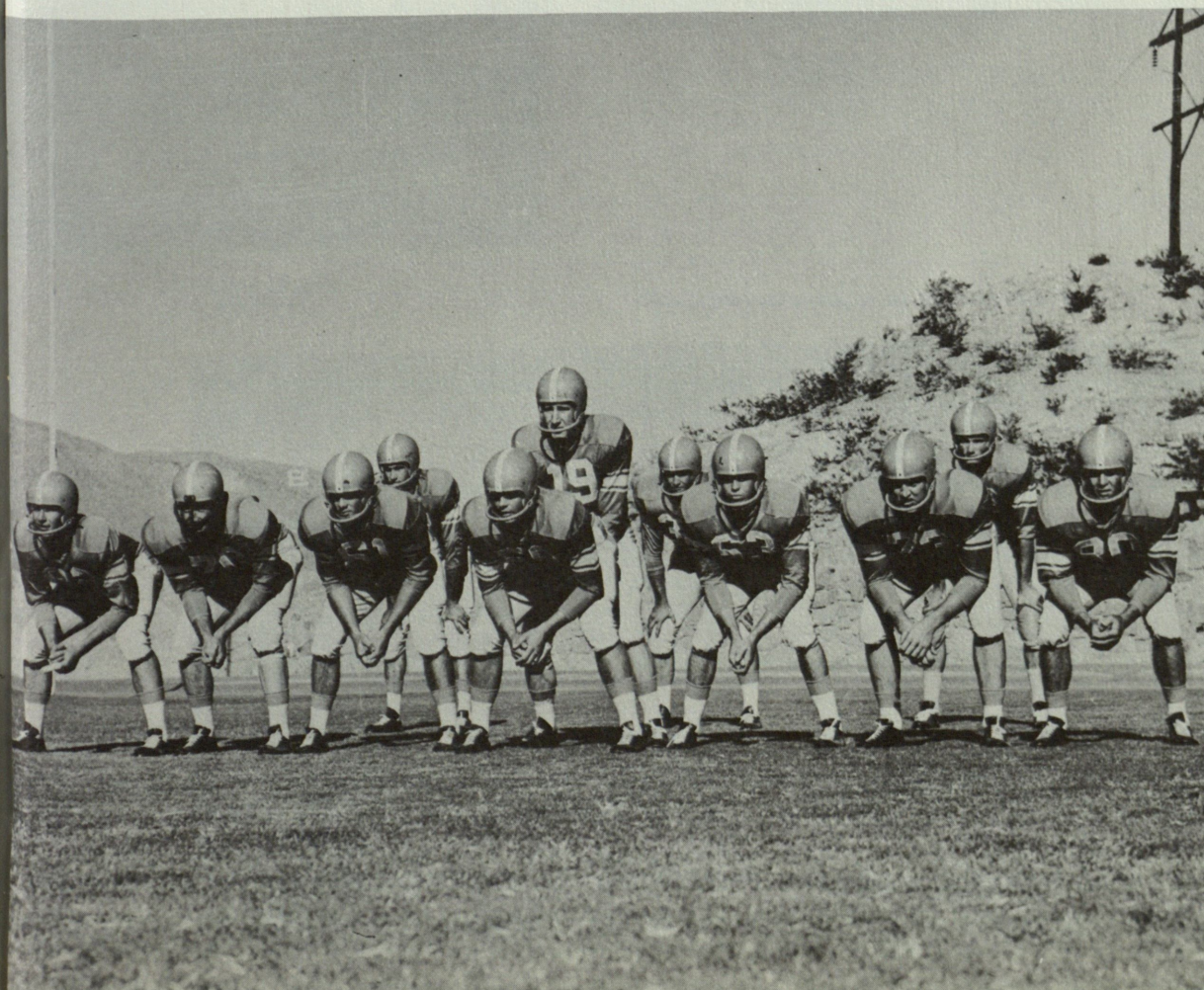

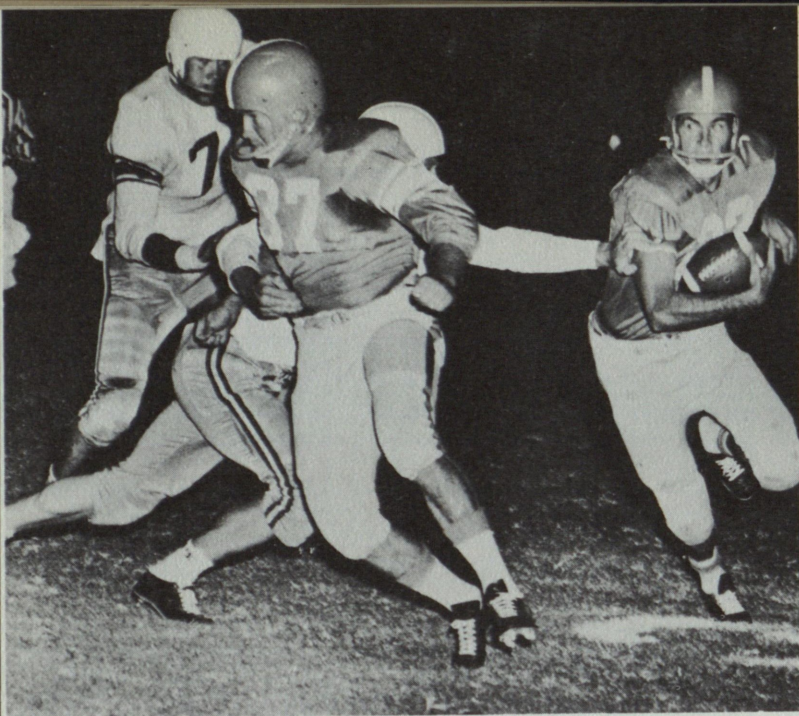

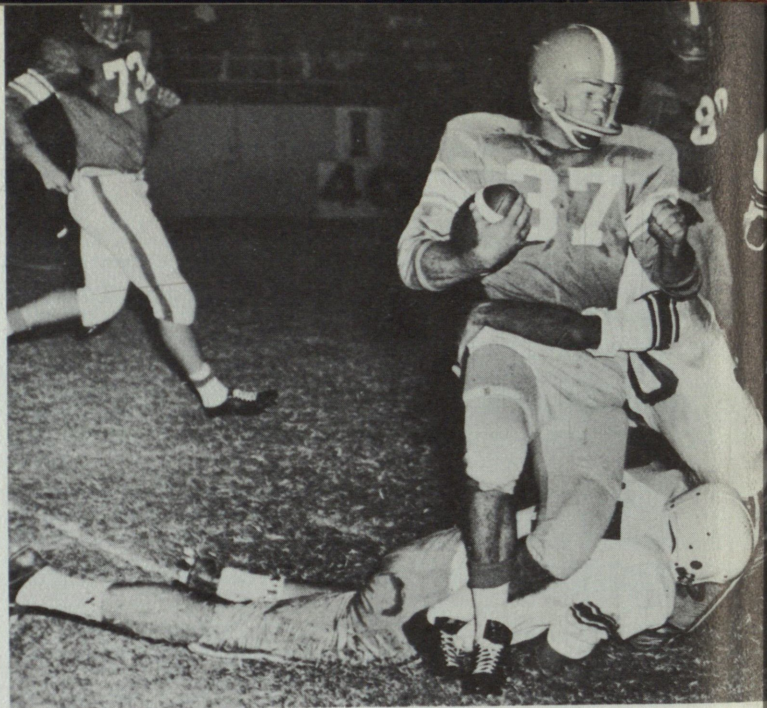

Probable Texas Western starting line-up throughout the season.

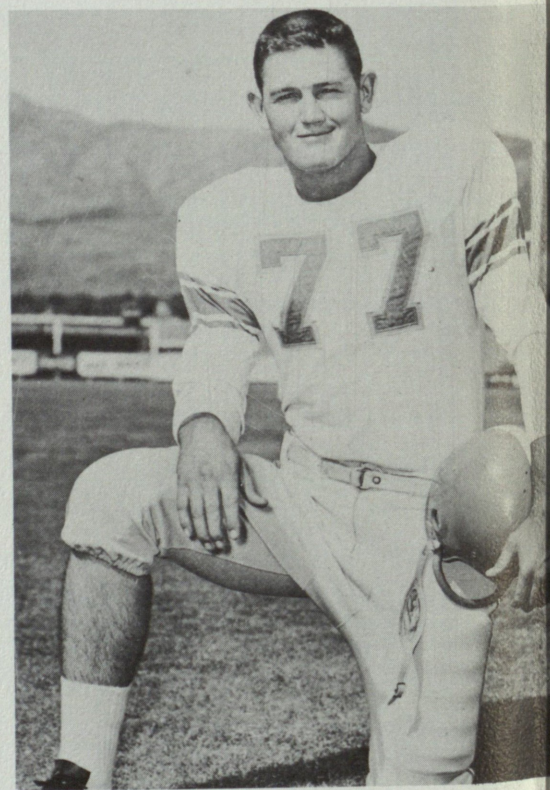

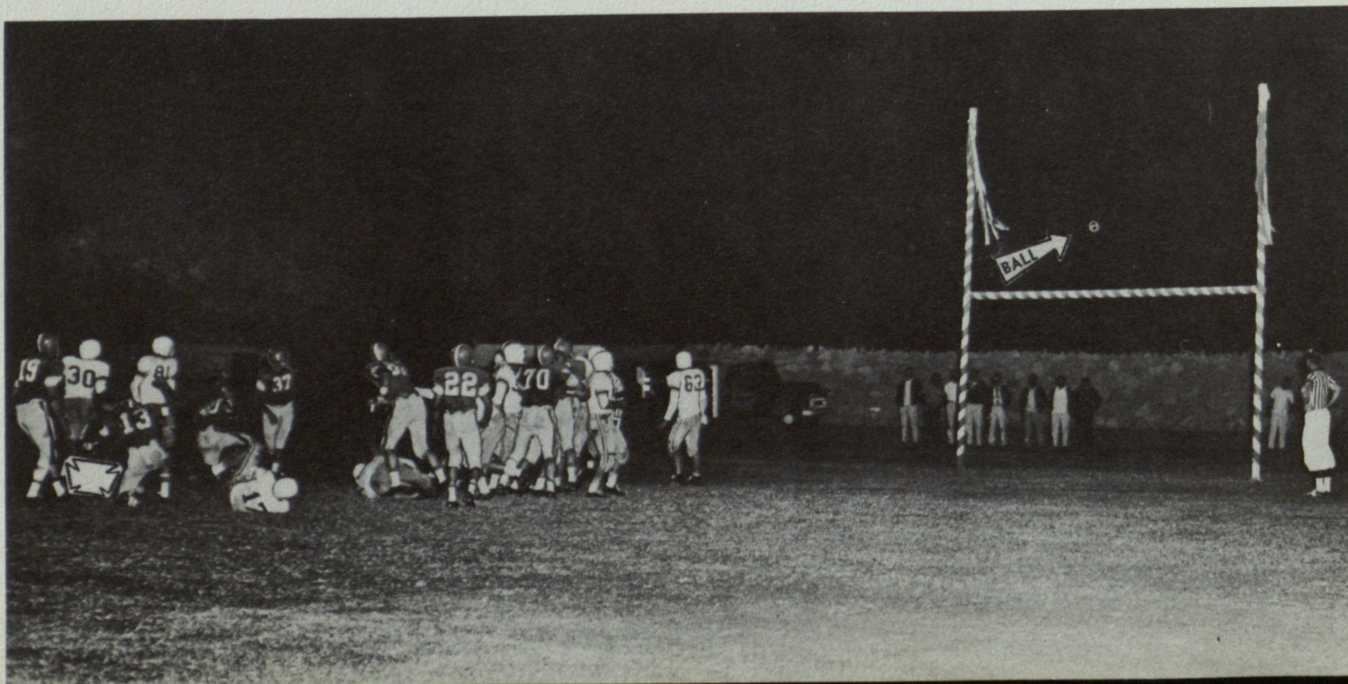

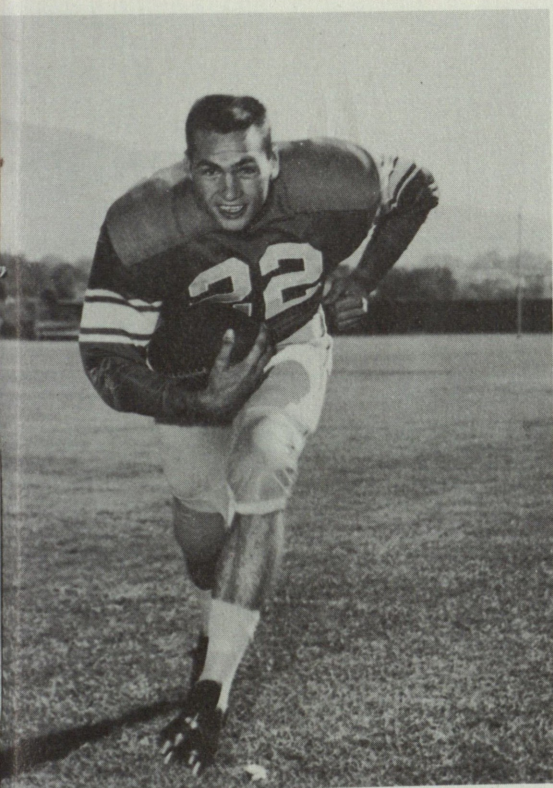


TEXAS WESTERN 14

Texas Western exploded with a 66 yard touchdown pass with two minutes left in the game to come from behind and score a 14-13 victory in the season's opener. The Miner cause was dealt a severe blow early in the game when North Texas scored on a series of first downs after the kickoff. Trailing by seven points until midway in the third quarter, the Miners struck hard and fast. Don Maynard, in a lightning move, snatched a pass from the hands of an intended North Texas receiver and

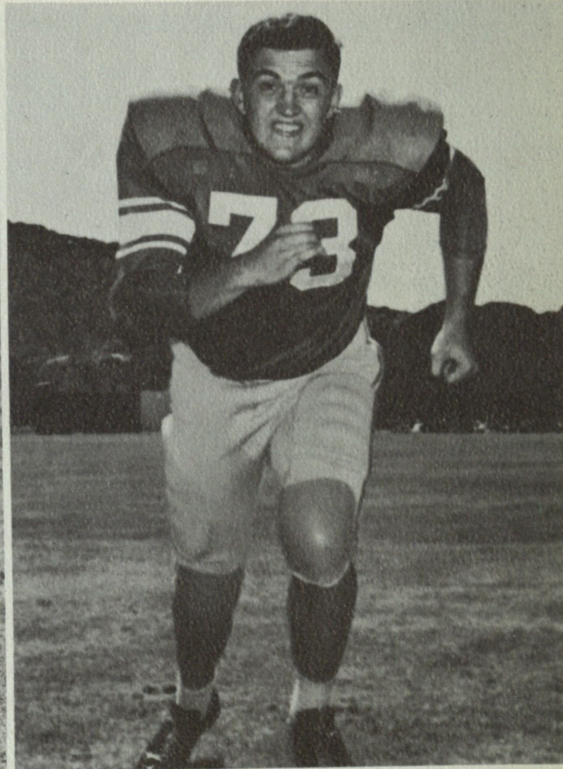
darted 48 yards, with the help of a key block from Jack Gothard, to paydirt. Laraba's dependable toe quickly tied the score at 7 all. With two minutes remaining in the game Laraba faded back and threw 41 yards to speeding Don Maynard who took the ball on the 25 and won the race to the end zone. Laraba's educated toe came through again. The final score was 14-13 in what many T.W.C. fans called a very pleasant evening.



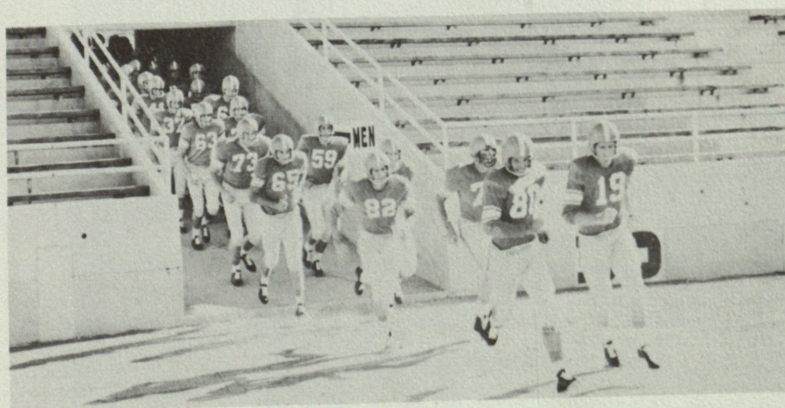

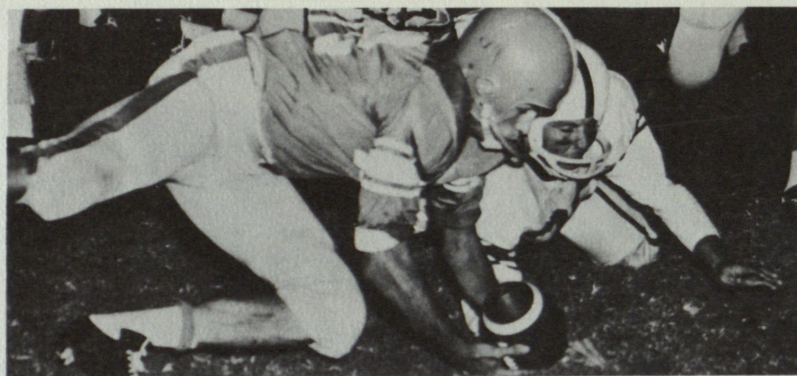

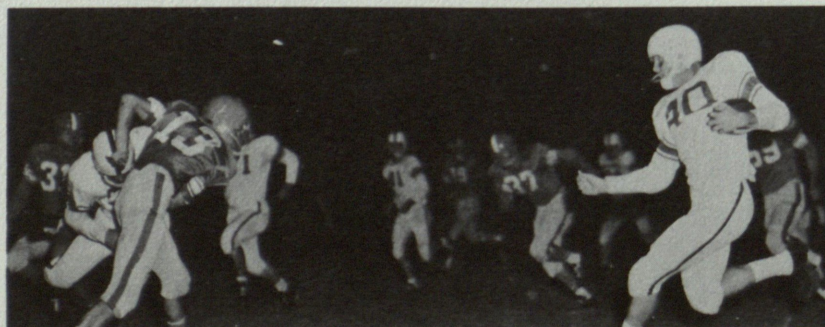

Texas Western spotted West Texas two touchdowns in the first quarter and then battled back for a 20-12 victory. During the first quarter the Buffaloes marched for two touchdowns but missed the extra points. An exchange of punts in the second quarter started the Miners rolling. With gains by Maynard and Bevers and an 8-yard gamble by Laraba, the Miners picked up a first down on the West Texas two. Ward punched through for the touchdown, and Maynard booted the

point. The second touchdown came late in the second quarter as the result of another short punt while the Miners raced 61 yards against time. Ward started the Miners toward the final TWC counter with his 44-yard sprint, the longest run of the game. Ward was halted on the Buffalo 21. The Buffaloes gambled on the fourth down and failed. Time ran out, leaving the Miners victorious in their first Border Conference game. A highlight of the game was a bullet punt of 69 yards by Willie Vasquez.

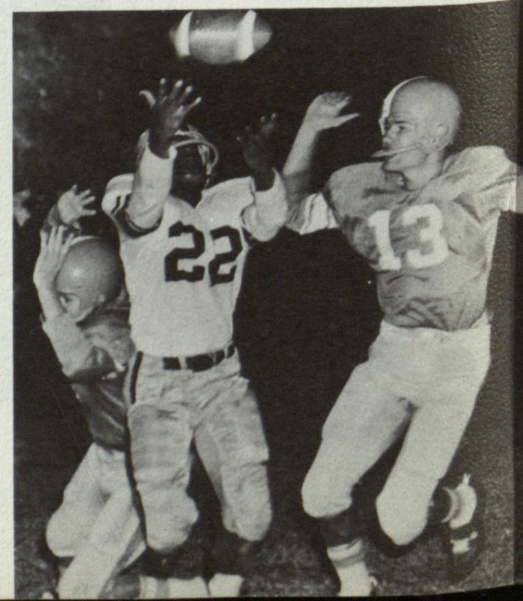

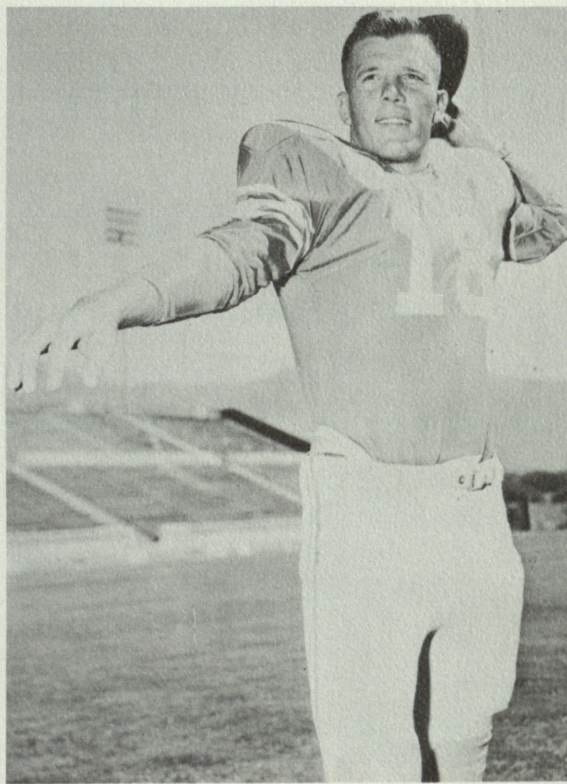
Texas Western streaked back with three second-half touchdowns in a bruising battle to defeat Texas Tech 26-14. With an 11 yard scamper around end, quarterback Bob Forrest started the Miners' scoring. The lead was short-lived when the Red Raiders scored on a blocked Miner punt and kicked the point to go ahead 7-6. The Miners went ahead early in the third quarter on a 38 yard march climaxed by Charlie Ward's dash

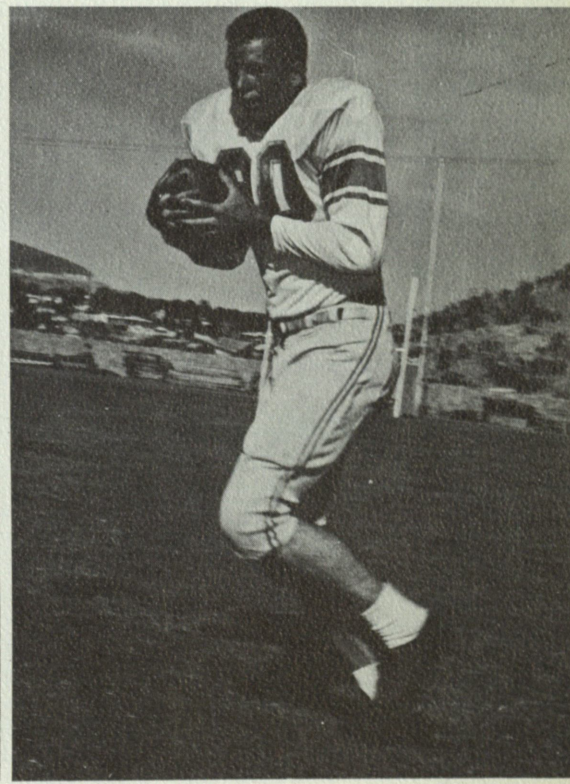
around end. The winning touchdown was the most spectacular of the game. With the ball on the Raider 41-yard line Bob Forrest took the ball around right end, twisted loose from two tacklers, and with a fantastic start-stop, squirming run, sped down the sideline for the score. 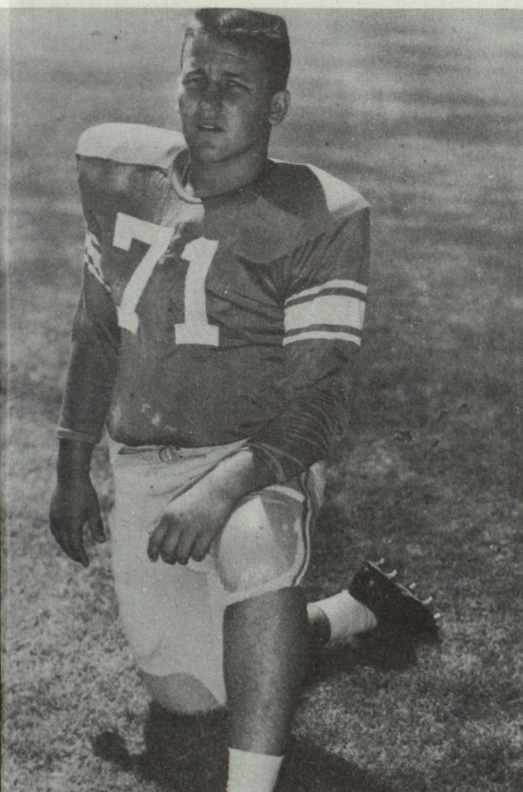


TEXAS WESTERN 42

Five backs shared the scoring honors. In only seven plays, Bevers was able to score with Maynard converting. Six minutes later, with Bevers carrying to the Miner 49 and a pass from Laraba to Maynard, another TD was chalked up for the Miners. Quentin Watkins blocked an Aggie punt in the Miners' end

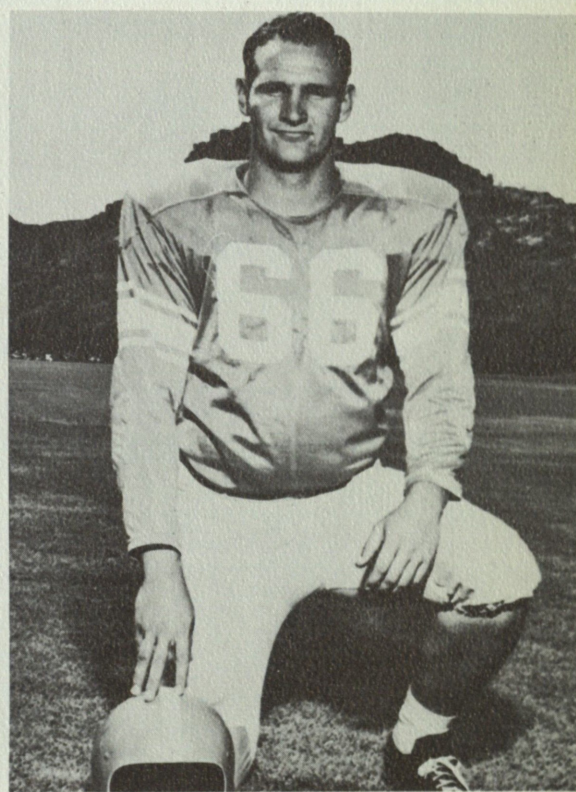

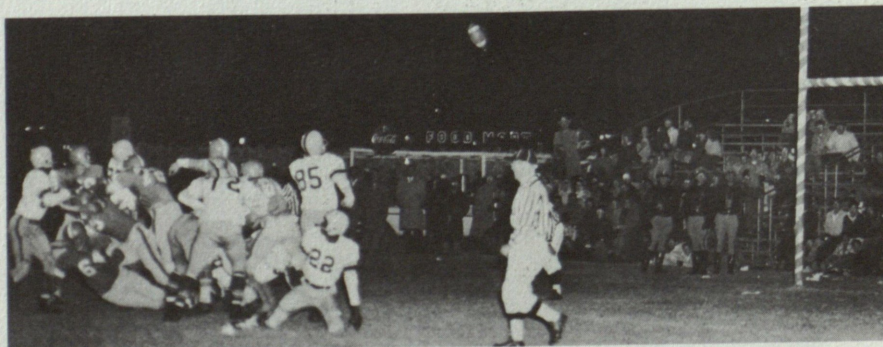

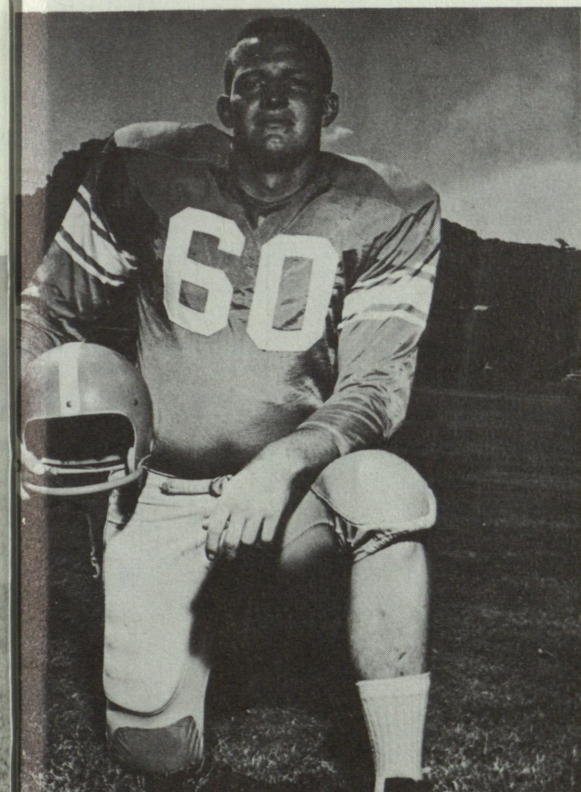

The Hardin-Simmons Cowboys defended their jinx—the Miners have never won in Abilene—and snapped the Miners' victory string with a 33-20 triumph. Five minutes deep in the first quarter the Cowboys capitalized on a Miner fumble by scoring the first touchdown of the game. The score was quickly tied when Jim Bevers took the kick-off on the twelve and raced 88 yards to the goal line. Bevers broke through a hole in the on-rushing Cowboy wave, cut to the left and streaked down the sideline, pulling away from his pursuers. After the score the Miners were swamped by three touchdowns before pulling

Texas Western's Miners handed the Arizona Wildcats their worst defeat in the 27-game series. The Miners scored quickly as Bradshaw broke the middle on a draw play and sprinted 68 yards. Maynard returned a quick kick to the Wildcat 24 to start the next Miner thrust. Laraba hit Bevers with a 10-yard pass, and later caught Gothard in the end zone with a perfect peg for the six. Early in the second quarter Laraba looped a long one to Maynard, who out-raced the defenders. The play covered 79 yards and Laraba made the conversion. The kick-

off was bobbled by an Arizona man while another kicked the ball into the end zone. Bevers recovered the ball for a touch-down. Laraba made a 32-yard pitch to Gothard, who ran the last six yards. Laraba threw two scoring passes in the last quarter, the first to Maynard, who also booted the extra point. The last touchdown came when Laraba hit Nick Tate in the corner of the end zone.

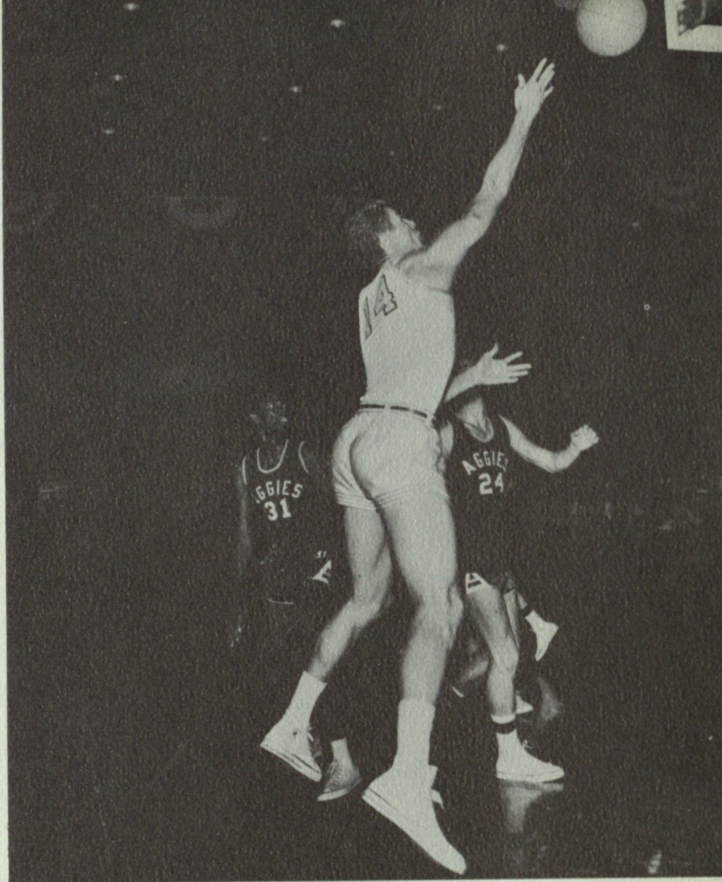


COACH GEORGE McCARTY
