Dear Mrs. Landau:

Your sister informs me that she has sent for her passport to Mexico City; unfortunately I was sick and she wished to expedite matters so she took care of the passport without my knowledge.

We received a reply from Philadelphia with reference to Rabbi Waser's legal entry into the U.S., and find that his statement was correct. We paid an additional 54 cents for the return reply, and I am enclosing the receipt received from our immigration inspector.

With further reference to papers necessary for this case, it will be required that Rabbi Waser secure and send to us a certified statement of what money he has in the bank; this statement is absolutely necessary and must show sufficient to guarantee the government against the L.P.C. feature.

Further developments are that the younger children must have quota numbers the same as the older girl, which will be demanded by cable as soon as we receive all other papers.

I am ready to assist in this case to the extent of my ability but it will be necessary for you to write to your sister that she should place confidence in me, and not try to handle matters through other sources, as she is doing at the present moment. I am sure that I have convinced you during your short stay in my home that I am sincere in my endeavors to help all immigrants deserving of my consideration. Send all papers that you have at the earliest possible moment, and oblige,

Dear Miss Deutsch:

Replying to your letter of December 27th, with reference to the above case, I have found it necessary for Mrs. Landau to furnish the required papers to us with which to present the case to the Consulate.

We require two(2) affidavits that guarantee the support of Mrs. Landau. Mrs. Landau will have to send a certified statement that she is willing to take this family of five(5) into her home; to educate the children and not allow them to work.

Mrs. Landau must send a certified statement of her financial conditions, and all papers must be in triplicate form.

Please forward the papers to me and I shall try to present the case to the consulate.

In the event that you do send your papers, I would like to know if you have any relatives in the United States because your and your wife's age may be questioned with the American Consul and an affidavit from a relative or friend will take care of this matter.
